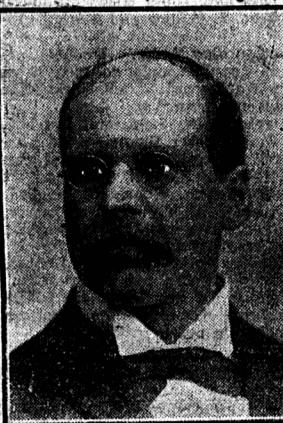

CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently farmers, do not know any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department proper, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as non-subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or in the Evening Globe. If there is an admission fee, a silver collection, or copies or of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, open the a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been sent, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase sales. Yesterday's obituary notices are also chargeable. Even notices which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either Morning Daily or Evening Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news.

(Continued from page six.) sic suited to such should be used. Avoid long prayers and instead have a half dozen or more which grow naturally out of the work of the session and are adapted to the needs of the children.

Emphasize a teaching thought by prayer. Let the children know what their offering is for. So far as possible discard the penny idea and the penny song. Bring in the missionary idea when the lesson leads to it. Arrange the children in the three age group for their lesson period.

Junior should be supplied with notebooks and pencils.

Have suitable exercises for dismissing children.

This was followed by a lesson in Sunday School hand-work by Miss L. Barrett, of Charlottetown, to a class of little children. Through the instinct of birds for flight with the change of the season the children were led to the thoughts of God's care for them.

General Secretary Ross spoke on the missionary instruction in elementary grades. He said, "Follow the graded idea in missionary instruction. Have a missionary superintendent, teach the missionary thought of the denomination, lead the children into definite missionary activity if opportunity offers in this missionary recruit."

Ninety per cent. of the missionary staff now in service received the missionary vision before they were six years. Use Bible and missionary stories and missionary objects."

The last item of the program was a roundtable and question-box and advisory problems. This was conducted by Mrs. Bryner who gave much valuable information. Among other things Mrs. Bryner said that what the child carries home should be from the lesson of the day not some thing from the lesson of the following Sunday. She incidentally scored a prevalent custom of assigning home work on advanced methods to young children in the public schools.—J.
