O'Leary Power Line Connected

The newly erected 12,000 volt power line connecting O'Leary with Summerside was put in operation on Wednesday, when electric current purchased from the Summerside Electric Company Ltd. flowed into the business establishments and residences of about 200 consumers in O'Leary and surrounding districts for the first time.

Present at the time the current started to flow into the West Prince centre were V. A. Ainsworth, General Manager of the Maritime Electric Co., A. G. Ley, Distribution Superintendent for the company and L. W. Hacker, Plant Superintendent of the Summerside Electric Light Plant.

Three Charlottetown men, Winston McKay, foreman, Darryl Wilson and Alvin Andrews, and eight O'Leary men were employed on the last three miles of line work from O'Leary corner in and completed the job Wednesday morning. The line from Summerside to Mt. Pleasant is owned by the town of Summerside. The next jump from Mt. Pleasant to O'Leary was constructed for the Provincial Government by the Maritime Electric on a contract basis. The latter line is about 13 miles long and is leased to Summerside Electric Co. by the Government. The last three miles was constructed and is owned by the same company.

In order that O'Leary might receive power and competent service as soon as possible arrangements were made to have the current purchased from the Summerside plant and distributed by the Maritime Electric. It is understood that as time permits new equipment will replace the lines, poles and fixtures presently in use.

Consider Route Of Trans-Canada Road In P. E. I.

A special meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held last night in the Town Hall with the vice president R. S. Hinton presiding in the absence of the president, Mr. T. Earle Hickey. The meeting was held for the purpose of considering the question of the proposed Trans-Canada Highway in the Province. Considerable discussion took place by the members and it was moved by Mr. Donald Baker that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolved that a committee of three be appointed to draft a resolution to be presented to the Provincial Government, with copies to local representatives, suggesting that the present pavement be retained as the Trans-Canada Highway in conformity with the original idea conceived and approved in 1935; also that copies of the resolution be sent to the Town Councils of Kensington and Hunter River.

The motion was seconded by Mr. W.M. McIlsh and adopted by the meeting. The three members appointed to draft the resolution were R. S. Hinton, Fred Bell and T. J. Inman.

The secretary Harold Rodd announced that in connection with the meeting of the members of the Maritime Board of Trade to be held in Charlottetown on September 29th and 30th that a supper meeting at which these visitors would be guests would be held at the Olympia Restaurant Summerside on Thursday Evening, Sept. 29th. Details of this meeting were left in the hands of the entertainment committee to finalize.

representatives to sit in a Canadian Commons.

Appointment of Senator Elie Beaugard of Quebec as Speaker of the Senate and election of Ross MacDonald as Speaker of the Commons were part of the early formalities which preceded the actual opening at 4 p.m. ADT.

Mr. MacDonald, 57, a native of Toronto, and Liberal member for Brantford, succeeds Hon. Gaspar Fautoux (L.-Montreal St. Mary's) as the position alternates back from a French-speaking to an English-speaking member.

Senator Beaugard, a lawyer and business man from Outremont, Que., served during the last Parliament as chairman of the Senate banking committee. He succeeds Senator J. H. King of British Columbia.
