SOCIALISTS VOTE FOR WORK

BRUSSELS, April 28 (Special)—The delegates to the National Socialist Congress voted by a three-fourths majority for an immediate resumption of work.

One thousand delegates from all parts of Belgium were present. Mr. Edouard Anseele, one of the socialist leaders, opened the proceedings with a long speech on behalf of the strike committee. He reviewed the objects, the progress and the results of the strike, which he said had attained sufficient success to permit the socialists to demobilize their forces and await the course of events.

Mr. Vanderveide, the socialist leader, explained the advantage gained by the vote in the Chamber of Deputies, which opened the way for the revision of the constitution desired by all workers.

The action of the congress seems to be generally accepted with favor, but the miners may refuse to work for a time. It is expected that the resumption will be quite general.

The extra Parliamentary commission on electoral reform, it is announced, will be nominated next week.

The miners at Mons are profoundly dissatisfied at the outcome of the strike and say they will not return to work until they are granted universal suffrage, even if they have to remain idle for six months.

TRUE DEMOCRACY

A Real Reverence for the Industrial Personality

Rev. Archdeacon Cody of Toronto has defined what true social democracy is in aim and methods of practical realization. "Three great principles make up the principles of democracy," he said. "They are (1) the things that are common to all men are more important than the things that are peculiar to one man; (2) we say of all men that they are our own flesh and blood. This is the central principle of democracy; (3) the most vital things have to be left to the ordinary man, for example, the choice of rulers. I hold, therefore, that the test of democracy is reverence for personality." Dr. Cody then proceeded to trace the character of the relation of the individual to the social organism or State. And he found the individual, even in the ideal state of the Greek, was subordinated to the social organism. There was no reverence for the individual as a human, thinking being, as a social creature.

"Now," said the speaker, "the modern State is based upon the Christian ideal of the brotherhood of man. Christianity widens the idea of citizenship to cosmopolitanism, and then it consecrates personality, the value of the individual in and for the State. The modern State preserves what is best from the ancient state and supplements and corrects it with ideas of personality. It is neither an atomism nor a swamping socialism. It insists that each individual must give of his best to the whole, but that he must give it freely and gladly. The exaggerated idea of co-operation. The modern state tends to exaggerate the idea of individual initiative. Now, this is no academic discussion, for the same ideas are represented to-day in the civilization of the Orient and of the Occident. Reverence for personality is not fundamental in the ideals of Orient civilization, though they are in Japanese and the Chinese are beginning to adopt the Occidental ideas of civilization, and chiefly the Christian idea of reverence for personality in the conduct of life and the state. This is a fundamental moral principle, philosophically enunciated by Kant, Heyd and Lotze. And no man or nation can degrade personality in others without thereby degrading themselves. And what holds true of individuals holds true of nations in their international relations. In these there must be reverence for personality. This idea may exist in strange places. It exists in some aristocracies and it is absent from some democracies. A true democracy is one which is permeated with a real reverence for individual personality. Therefore, it is that the future of the Canadian people lies in the future of the Canadian conscience. For true democracy means moral service and the possibility of a man's life for every man."

THIS BALL PLAYER NEVER USED GLOVES

Jerry Denny Says Baseball is no Faster Now Than in the '90's

It was in the latter part of 1894 that Jerry Denny severed his connection with big league baseball. His passing marked the finish of one of the greatest third basemen in the world. Although Jerry Denny played in minor leagues as late as 1904, he never used a glove, and to the last was a marvel on hard hit ground balls. His work in two games in 1882 and



1890 proves his class, with Providence he had five putouts and 11 assists in 17 chances, and with New York he had 11 assists and 2 putouts out of 14 chances, one afternoon. Denny began his career in 1876, when 17. His first professional engagement was with Providence in 1881; in 1883 he led the third basemen with an average of .875. In 1886, with St. Louis, he and Estorbrook led the league again in 1889, with a .913 average. Denny made his great reputation while playing against such men as Jim McGarr, Billy Nash and Ed. Williamson, the best men that ever played the position.

"The team work is better to-day than it was in the '90's and '00's, but baseball is no faster," says Denny, and many a veteran fan will probably admit that if Jerry was in his prime now and on third base, he would hold his own with the fastest infielders of this day.

The funeral took place at Ashford, Kent, of Mrs. Catherine Keeler, aged ninety-four, whose husband, a naval officer, was drowned in a shipwreck a few months after their marriage, and who was for seventy years a widow.

AMERICA'S CUP PRIZED TROPHY

Interesting History of the Great Sporting Trophy First Offered in England in 1851

The most prized of sporting trophies is the "America's Cup" which cost \$500 and was offered by the Royal Yacht Squadron in 1851 for a race around the Isle of Wight. Foreign boats were invited to compete, and the America, owned by Commodore J. C. Stevens and several other members of the New York Yacht Club, was entered. There was no time allowance for tonnage, and the America won a very creditable race, since she was by no means the largest of the competitors. The trophy thereupon became the property of Commodore Stevens. In 1857 Commodore Stevens and the other partners deeded the cup to the New York Yacht Club, to be held as a perpetual challenge trophy for international races between vessels of not less than 30 nor more than 300 tons, measured by the Customs House rule of the country to which the vessels belonged. The original deed said that the "parties desiring to sail for the cup may make any match with the yacht club in possession that may be determined upon by mutual consent, but in case of disagreement as to terms the match to be sailed over the usual course of the annual regatta of the yacht club in possession of the cup and subject to its rules and sailing regulations."

One Against a Fleet
The deed thus gives the New York Yacht Club a very strong position, and permits it to dictate the terms of any match. The club's idea of sportsmanship was illustrated when the first challenge came from Mr. James Ashbury in 1869. Mr. Ashbury wished to race his yacht Cambria against any yacht the New York club might designate as defender, but the club declined to name a boat and insisted that the Cambria should sail against the whole yacht club fleet. This Mr. Ashbury consented to, and an American yacht named Magic was the winner. In 1871 he returned to the attack, and on this occasion it was agreed that there should be a single defender. The Columbia defended the cup until she lost through an accident after which the club substituted the Sappho. The cup remained in the United States, but the race ended in a protest.

A Canadian Challenger
The Countess of Dufferin challenged and lost in 1876, and in 1881 the Canadian sloop Atlanta challenged and was defeated by the Mischief. After this race the New York Yacht Club decided that the deed of gift was not adequate, and returned the cup to the surviving donor, George L. Schuyler, who amended the deed of gift by providing that challenging yachts should proceed to the port of contest on their own bottoms, and also that no vessel could race again until two years had elapsed. In 1882 the club revised its system of measurement, which determined the time allowance to be given or received. In 1891 the rule was again changed, and the present rule was put in force in 1905. In the meantime the Galatea and the Geneta had been defeated by American defenders. In 1887 the Thistle challenged, but was found to be longer than her official measurements. The dispute was referred to Mr. Schuyler, who decided that the difference should not invalidate the challenge, and the race was sailed, the challenger being defeated.

The Dumraven Charges
In 1889 Lord Dumraven challenged, but the Royal Yacht Squadron declined to approve his challenge on the ground that the deed of gift was not adequate in the interest of good sport. In 1892, and again in 1894, Dumraven challenged, but was twice defeated. After the second contest charges of sharp practice against the defender was made by Lord Dumraven, and a most unpleasant sensation was created. In 1898 Sir Thomas Lipton sent his first challenge, and a committee was sent across the Atlantic to arrange the contest. Shamrock II, Shamrock III, and Shamrock IV were all defeated in turn, and then Sir Thomas came to the conclusion that he could not win under the rules. So in 1907 he asked if the New York Yacht Club would consent to reduce the size of the defending yacht to the size of a challenger that he wished to build. This request was rejected, and the refusal has been repeated.

WHERE THE CASTLE WENT

Lord Dufferin tells a good tale concerning his estate in the county Down. At Glanaboy stood the ruin of an old stronghold of the O'Nells. On a certain bright summer morning the first Marquis visited the spot with his steward, one Dan Mulligan, who was quite a character.

"Drawing a line roughly with his walking stick round the crumbling ruins of the castle, Lord Dufferin stroked his fastidious hair as he built a protecting wall to the frontage marked."

Then he went to India, feeling assured of the preservation of what remained of the historic structure. When he returned home his lordship hastened to visit Glanaboy. There was in sight, seemingly, not a trace of the O'Neil relic. The Marquis sent for his steward.

"Where's the castle, Dan?" demanded he.

"The castle, my lord? That old thing? Sure, I had it pulled down to build the wall wid."
