Fast Times At Yesterday's Free-For-All

Chestnut Bars Goes Mile In 2.06; Jean Henley Wins 2.19; Loretta Abbe The Futurity

Almost perfect weather brought a record attendance surpassing even Wednesday's 52-year-old figures at the Old Home Week and Provincial Exhibition race meet yesterday. Spectators saw two good classes for aged horses and one for baby trotters with an excellent line of vaudeville. The juveniles created considerable interest, their manners were faultless and they caused the starter no trouble at all. The rules governing the races for the two-year-olds only allows two heats and as two of the colts won a heat each a third had to be raced to decide the winner. The 2.19 Trot and Pace, second division, brought out a well balanced field of seven, six pacers and the old favorite trotter, Hal Britton 2.094. Jean Henley, in winning, equalled her record of 2.10. It was the Free For All that was the principal drawing card of the afternoon. The six starters were horses that had earned many victories and each had his followers. All Grattan 2.061, because of his string of wins last season, Duddy Patch 2.061, most of the Free For All's in the Maritimes this season, Victor Lee 2.07, who was one of Canada's leading race winners last year, Rainey G. Henley 2.06, winner of several Free For Alls in 1941, the old warrior Tracey Hanover 2.03 and Chestnut Bars 2.061, fresh from a string of firsts in Quebec—those were the horses that stepped the fastest three heats in the Maritimes this year, the middle one of which was paced by Chestnut Bars in 2.06, coming within a half second of the track pacing record. The highlight of the afternoon was the first half of the third heat in the Free For All when Chestnut Bars, starting in last position, went away fast, his driver urging him to the limit in order to break the track record. Neck and neck, Duddy Patch at the pole, and Chestnut Bars raced like a team down to the half and still on even terms until they struck the lower turn when Duddy made a break and Chestnut Bars went on in his try for a record. He failed—the time being 2.07 but it was officially announced that the first half was paced in a minute and three-quarters which timekeeper L. B. MacMillan stated was the fastest half ever raced here during his 42 years in the start. The program was put on promptly at two o'clock and with all acts of vaudeville was concluded shortly after five o'clock. The vaudeville acts of which the description appears elsewhere were given an excellent reception.

Veteran Quebec Horseman Dies

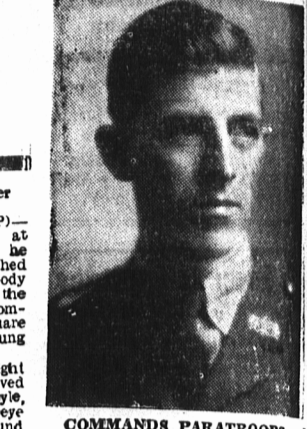
MONTREAL, Aug. 13 (CP)—Frederick Vincent, 80, prominent Canadian horseman, stable owner and judge for many years at horse shows in Canada and the United States, died here today. His widow, the former Mary Elizabeth Farrell of Woodstock, Ont., a son J. Farrell and a daughter, Mrs. E. Moore Gagnon, all of Montreal, survive. He was at one time the leading amateur steeplechase rider in Canada and he was the first man to jump a horse more than six feet in this country.

Maritime Golf Tournament Starts Monday

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Aug. 13 (CP)—The qualifying round of the Maritime Championship Golf Tournament, to be staged at the Riverside Golf and Country Club Tuesday and Wednesday of next week, will be played Monday morning, Percival Streeter, a director of the Maritime Golf Association, announced tonight. Mr. Streeter announced a new departure for this year's tournament. Hitherto the qualifying round has consisted of 36 holes but this year it has been decided there will be but 18 holes. All 18 holes will be played Monday morning. The amateurs will participate in match play while professionals will decide a champion by 72 holes of medal play. The last Maritime Tournament was played in 1939 at Halifax when William Crawford of the Westfield Country Club won the championship. In 1940 and 1941 the annual event was canceled due to the war. Crawford will not be on hand to defend his title as he is now in the United States. The annual dinner of the Association will be held Monday night. Among those to compete will be Jim Hogan of the Riverside Club, this year's New Brunswick Prince Edward Island champion; Billy Beer of the Charlottetown Golf Club, runner-up to Hogan in the N.B.-P.E.I. championship; Pete Campbell and Walter Reed Jr., both of the Aroostook Valley Club, Port Fairfield, Me.; Percival Streeter, R. G. McInerney and H. S. Gregory of the Riverside Club; Dr. F. O. Turner of the Fredericton Golf Club, Jim Foster of the Westfield Club, and Rev. J. Walter Holland of the Riverside Club, who recently won the open field day for Maritime senior golfers at Riverside. Amateur entries have been received from Riverside, Westfield, Fredericton, St. Andrews, Port Fairfield, Me., Amherst, Halifax and Charlottetown. It is expected that other entries will be forthcoming. The draw will be made on Sunday afternoon. Those who have been entered include Vernon Borch former Riverside pro; Syd Stewart, present Riverside pro; Fred Hancock of the Fredericton Golf Club and Bert Jamieson of the Ridgewood Golf and Country Club.

Tribe rallies to Zivic stops Beat Tigers 3-2 Garvey Young In six rounds

NEW YORK, Aug. 13 (AP)—With two men out and the bases loaded in the ninth inning, Oris Hockett came to bat at Cleveland today and smashed out a double that drove in three runs, enabling Cleveland Indians to edge out Detroit Tigers 3-2 and climb back in the victory column in the American League. It was the Tribe's first victory in its last eight starts. The Indians previously had tied one and lost three games in the five-game series. The Cubs lambasted four Cardinal pitchers for 13 hits while Passeau was pummeled for 10, including Terry Moore's fourth home run of the season in the third inning. Included in the Cub's attack was Bill Nicholson's 11th homer of the season with runner on base in the eighth inning. The winner—Jean Henley 2.10—is owned by William Crutchank and was driven by William Hood.

Two classified dashes will be given in which the starters will be selected from horses that have raced during the day and have not met with any success or not very much.
