OTTAWA'S WELCOME. Ottawa, September 9—At noon today the city of Ottawa formally welcomed Premier Borden back to the capital. He did not go to his office in the morning but remained at his home dealing with correspondence until noon when an automobile procession stopped at his door and invited him to go down to the city hall. Premier Borden accepted the invitation and followed by a hundred cars whirled off to the city hall, where he was met by Mayor Hope, the controllers and aldermen. The Mayor read an address couched in warm terms, welcoming the prime minister back to Canada and congratulating him upon his continued good health.

After the welcome the prime minister went to the exhibition grounds, where he lunched with the exhibition directors and formally opened the Central Canada exhibition which will run a week. The proceedings were of the ordinary character. The premier, in a brief speech delivered in the main building, declared the big show open in all its branches. In the evening a dinner is to be given by the local conservatives to Hon. Mr. Borden, and tomorrow meetings of the government will be commenced. It is unlikely that the naval question or other important matters will be dealt with for some time. There is a big accumulation of routine business demanding immediate consideration, and this will require some time. In the immediate future a grand deal will be away from Ottawa a good deal of the time. He has dinner engagements in Montreal and Toronto, and a delegation is here to secure his presence at the opening of the Halifax exhibition.

OTTAWA, September 9—Before the first session of the trade and labor council of Canada convention opened here today, those in charge announced that all records for attendance of delegates had been broken, almost double in fact. Last year at Calgary there were 173 delegates; this year the credential committee state 300 delegates will be accorded seats and votes.

The first session today was largely a matter of pleasantness between civic officials and local parliamentarians welcoming the delegates to Guelph. President Parker, of the Guelph trades and labor council, opened the proceedings, being followed by Mayor Thorpe and Alderman Howard on behalf of the city council; Hon. Mr. Crothers, federal minister of labor; Hugh Guthrie, M. P. of South Wellington, took part in the opening ceremonies.

President Waters then took charge receiving greetings from fraternal delegat J. T. Smith, of Kansas city, from the American federation of labor. This afternoon was an open date for the delegates and a trip has been planned to prison farm, where the labor men will have a chance to hear Hon. Mr. Hanna explain his pet hobby. Then the big convention will get down to business in earnest. The big meeting is on Tuesday evening when a representative from each province will speak at an opening meeting in the armory, where the meetings are being held. J. Keir Hardy, labor leader of the British house of commons, will be the attraction for that evening and will discuss labor conditions in Britain.

Another outing is planned for Wednesday afternoon to see the agricultural college, while a monster banquet tendered by the labor council will be a feature for Thursday evening.

Many matters affecting the labor world will come up for discussion, and as the socialists are strongly represented, some interesting debates are assured.

YUKON MONEY ORDERS. OTTAWA, September 9—The finance department has effected an important improvement in the conditions under which business is transacted between the Yukon and other parts of Canada and the United States.

By an arrangement dating back to January 1st, 1905, the cost of money orders issued at post offices in the Yukon payable in Canada and the United States was double that charged elsewhere in Canada. The post office and financial department have recently been looking into the matter and have re-arranged the agreement with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, so that the business is done on the same basis as that which prevails in other parts of the country, no special remuneration being charged. Thus the cost of these transactions have been halved.

THE THOMASSEN CASE. SYDNEY, September 9—Rev. Mr. Kinsale, Presbyterian missionary to foreigners, received a telegram today from the solicitor of the Russian consular agent at Montreal to the effect that consider the case of Harry Thomassen, convicted in June last of murdering a shipmate if any new evidence could be brought forward. Mr. Kinsale has interested himself on behalf of Thomassen, who stoutly maintains his innocence. He had petitions asking for a commutation of sentence but the department declined to interfere. The trial judge, Mr. Justice Drysdale, then granted a reprieve till the 20th of September. Mr. Kinsale has some new evidence which he will forward at once.

A SHOOTING ACCIDENT. SYDNEY MINES, September 9—Particulars of the shooting accident at Shenacadis yesterday were received today, when Coroner Francis, of Sydney Mines, and Finlay Vickers, father of the young man who was shot, returned here with the body. It appears that young Vickers and his friends were camping out and on Sunday were sitting outside their camp. One of them had a revolver and two boys who happened to come along asked for it. While they were examining it, it went off, the bullet passing thru the hand of one of them and striking Vickers between the neck and shoulder. He lived only about fifteen minutes. The inquest has not yet been held, as there is some difficulty about getting the in-ured boy who is wanted as a witness into the town.
