The Sacrament of the Wofv'le Lord's Supper was administered to a large number of communicants in the Presbyterian Church Kensington, on Sunday afternoon by Rev Edwin Smith. In the evening a large and appreciative audience gathered in the Methodist Church and listened to a farwell sermon on "Earnestness" by Rev. W. A. Thomson. A beautifully rendered solo by Mrs. Gordon Tuplin was part of the attractive music by the Choir. Week of prayer union services will be observed as follows:

Collection for the Hospital and organization of Lord's Day Alliance at the close. Friday, Jan. 11 in the Presbyterian church, leader Mr. Smith, address by Mr. Slackford. Topic, Prayer for all missionaries and all missionary organizations. Change of pulpits January 13 in the evening. In Christian Baptist Mr. McLaughlin, in Presbyterian Mr. Harlow and in Methodist Mr. Smith.

The new hall which has just been completed over Mr. John M. Clark's office and ware rooms for Court Chautauqua, I. O. F., is remarkably well arranged and finished. Entering from Water Street a narrow hallway fronts the top of the stairs across which and directly opposite the stairs is a door which will be used for exit only, except during public gatherings when it will also be used for an entrance. Towards the right this hallway turns into a large ante-room in which a door leads to the main hall and which will be the entrance door for the members of the Order. An adjoining ante-room, also with a door connecting it with the main hall will be used chiefly for candidates. There is also a closet in the room for the "goat" and paraphernalia. The hall has a hard wood floor, plastered ceiling and walls, with a four foot wainscoting of wood. Like other halls of the kind there is a platform at each end over which a pretty bracket work canopy hangs from the ceiling. The hall is lighted with incandescent lights which hang in clusters of three from the ceiling, while over the C. R.'s chair and V.C.R.'s chair the globes are colored red and blue. At the rear of the hall is a large room which can be used for a kitchen and through which exit can be had to the ground floor. These means of exit at both front and rear of hall will afford a great advantage in case of fire. The furniture which is all of solid nicely grained ash is elaborate in design and finish, and the general appearance of the hall strikes the observer as a most appropriate and comfortable place for any society. The work was done by the Mechanics Mfg. Co. and in a very creditable manner. The Foresters may well feel proud of such a meeting place which will compare favorably with any similar hall in the Province. A public dedication will take place on Friday the 18th inst. The first meeting in the new hall will be held by Court Cabot on Friday next.
