**Ten Times Denmark**

Poland today has a population of 33,000,000, exactly ten times that of Denmark, but, being much larger, is not nearly so densely populated as the latter. Agricultural exports have always been a feature of the area. In 1913 the number of hogs in the portions of Russia, Austria and Germany that now form Poland was about 500,000. At the census of 1921 the total had grown to 5,101,000 hogs, due to rearrangement, no doubt, of frontiers and genuine increase. This compares with 4,000,000 hogs in Canada in that year. What Polish export possibilities in bacon may be after the large home population has been supplied remains to be seen in the next few years, but it is noteworthy that several countries near Denmark, including Sweden, Holland and Poland, seem to be trying to get a growing share of the British bacon market. Throughout the coaches on all trains to which Dining and Cafe Cars are attached, little dodgers are now displayed before each meal, with several suggestions for a suitable combination of dishes. These dodgers are printed in both English and French. This gives the patron of the Dining-Car a little time to decide upon what he will order later and eliminates the tiresome necessity of studying a large menu card. If the traveller is accustomed to set a limit of price upon his meals, there is no need whatever to exceed it. The prices for a complete menu for Breakfast, Dinner and Supper are most moderate, ranging from 35 cents to \$1.25. Having made his choice according to pocket-book and appetite, upon entering the Dining-Car, the traveller will find himself served as quietly and satisfactorily as he would be in any well appointed home.

**JOINT OWNERS**

**WHO MAY VOTE**

Every voter, male or female, must be 21 years of age and a British subject either by birth or naturalization.

**FOR COUNCILMAN**

A voter, male or female, must own in his or her own right freehold property within the district of the value of \$325.00, and must have been in possession of the same for six months prior to June 14th, 1923. A lease holder is not entitled to a property vote.

A male voter who has served overseas in the Great War and who has resided twelve months in the electoral district is also entitled to vote for Councilman. This privilege is not extended to women who served overseas.

A property voter, male or female, has a vote in every district in which they hold the above property qualification.

**ASSEMBLYMAN**

Every person, male or female, who is 21 years of age and is a British subject has a vote if—

He or she has resided in the Province for twelve months and in the electoral district for two months prior to June 14th, or—

Who owns, or is in possession of as tenant property of the value of one hundred dollars, and has owned or been in possession of the same for six months prior to the test of the Writ (June 14.)

A voter may vote for Assemblyman in every district wherein he or she holds a property or tenancy qualification.

**JOINT OWNERS**

Where two or more persons are holding property jointly, each party will be entitled to vote either for Councilman or Assemblyman provided that his or her interest or shares of such property amounts to a value or sum sufficient to qualify him or her to vote—that is \$325.00 for Councilman or \$100.00 for Assemblyman.

**STUDENTS AND FISHERMEN**

Occasional absence from the Province not exceeding four months in the year, the time spent by students attending college and by mariners and fishermen in their callings is accounted as if spent within the Province or district.

**TAXES**
