RETURNED HEROES

Brief sketches are here appended of some of the soldiers from overseas who returned New Year's eve:

Gunner J. T. White Gunner White is a son of the late Robert White, Murray River. He enlisted with the 8th Siege Battery, and was transferred to the Headquarters Staff, and then to the 3rd Battery. After 18 months in France he was gassed at Lens last July.

Gunner L. P. Aitken Gunner Aitken is a son of Mr. George W. Aitken, Aitken's Ferry. He fought for over a year in France with the 8th Siege and was badly burned by cordite at Ljeven, March 25th last, and was in the hospital up to the middle of October.

Private W. T. Wilson Private Wilson is a son of the late Newton Wilson. He has been living with his uncle, J. M. McCormack, Boughton Island, ever since he was a boy. He enlisted in the 105th, was transferred to the 13th Royal Highland Regiment, fought 18 months in France and, on March 11, 1918, was gassed, and also wounded by shrapnel on the right shoulder. He has seen service at Vimy Ridge, Passchendaele, Lens and other battles in which the Canadians took a glorious part.

Sergeant Donald Stewart, M. M. Sergeant Stewart of Forest Hill, is a son of the late Donald Stewart of Grand View. He enlisted in Charlottetown in the 56th Draft, and fought for 28 months in France, first seeing service on the 8th August, 1915. He was transferred to the 15th Bat-

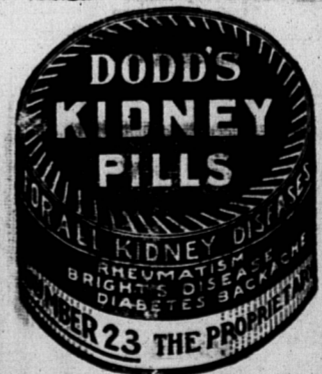
