**Three Councillors Retained Office and Three Rejected at Meeting Last Night.**

The last regular meeting of the present Town Council was held last evening with a full Board present.

A petition was read to be forwarded to the Governor General in Council asking that a sum be placed in the estimates for the present session of Parliament to assist in defraying the expense of opening Summer street to Water street.

Coun. Morrison moved, seconded by Councillor G. M. Reid to accept J. A. Baker's offer of his property necessary in opening Summer street to Water street for \$1,000. Mr. Baker to furnish sufficient clay to fill in the cellar of the Campbell Hotel Building. Councillor Muttart opposed the motion. The motion was carried, Councillor Muttart only dissenting.

Councillors G. M. Reid and Morrison spoke of the friendly spirit which had existed between the members of the Board and expressed the hope that their successors would experience the same good feeling.

The Council then drew lots to see which three would retain office for another year. Six cards each with a name of one of the Councillors were placed in envelopes and put in a hat, and six other cards, three with the word "retained" and three with the word "rejected" were placed in envelopes and put in another hat. The two policemen then each drew an envelope from either one of the hats and carried them singly to the Town Clerk who opened them and declared those retained—John L. Reid, Wm. Muttart, G. M. Reid.

Rejected—James A. Morrison, Patrick Ryan, Joseph Cox.

Council adjourned.

**POPULATION OF JAPAN.**

London, Feb. 9.—Japan's population reaches a total of at least 5,000,000 more than Great Britain. Tokio has a population of about 1,500,000. Osaka between 800,000 and 900,000 and there are twenty others with a population of more than 50,000 each.
