ILLEGAL SHOOTING OF BLACK DUCKS—From various sections of Kings and Queens Counties come reports of illegal black duck shooting, dating from as early as July 14. There is not a particle of sport or sportsmanship in the killing of ducks in July and August, in many cases when they are unable to fly. It is not giving the birds a chance or playing fair with the sportsman who "plays the game" and waits until the season opens. In this connection it is important to note that under the Dominion regulations any person or persons caught at this illegal practice will have their guns, ammunition, decoys and birds in possession, if any, seized and will be brought before a Magistrate on a charge of violating the Migratory Birds Convention Act. Parents of juniors, who are in the habit of frequenting the shores and marshes in possession of firearms during the close season, are requested to use their influence toward stopping this practice and help to avoid any unpleasantness which may result therefrom.

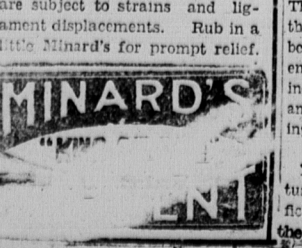

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 12.—An easier feeling developed for some lines of cash grain here today and prices for wheat, oats, and barley were reduced three, two and one cent per bushel, respectively. The dairy and produce markets were generally unchanged. The demand for butter was fair and values were steady. Receipts were 13 boxes. The trade in these continued quiet, but the undertone to the market was firm. Receipts were 8,369 boxes. The egg market was steady. Receipts were 2,979 cases. Potatoes sold at 65 to 70 cents per bag of 80 pounds, new locally grown stock.

check the increase in lists of jobless but the "dole" or government insurance remittances to hundreds of thousands has been necessary costing the several governments far into the millions to meet the emergency.

The London Herald, on March 3, said the total unemployed in the entire world was 16,000,000. The Herald, a Laborite newspaper informed its readers that the United States situation was worse than that of any other country, advancing the figure 6,000,000 as the total in that country.

The Herald at the same time said there were 4,500,000 jobless in Germany, 2,000,000 in Russia, 1,500,000 in Great Britain, 8,000,000 in Japan and 500,000 in Italy. The figures later were modified by a cut of 1,000,000 in the United States' total.

Great Britain's army of out-of-work shot past the 2,000,000 mark on July 28, as registered in labor exchanges throughout the country.

The Labor government has not hit upon a panacea and the prospect is that it will become a national affair rather than a party matter.

In Britain the worst hit industries are textiles, with nearly 450,000 idle, transport with 433,000; building trades, 170,000 coal mining, 255,000 and engineering in its various branches, 413,000.

Increase is Shown

Germany has experienced an increase of 1,000,000 in unemployment in the last year, of whom 51,000 lost their jobs in the last fortnight. In Berlin alone there are 326,935 jobless, as shown in July 1 reports.

The latest jump in the nation-wide totals gave Germany a chilly surprise. Mines, factories and merchants in all sections, it was shown, have been laying off help during June and July and only recently the Socialist government warned them not to expect good contracts if they employed "unskillful" methods of cutting their staffs.

Italy's outlook took a turn for the better today when the government made known that extensive plans had been made for unemployment in state work of many thousands of persons.

The government held the attitude that the gains in unemployment must be checked before winter and to that end laid down an extensive road building program to begin September 1 and 5, employing 37,000 men and costing upwards of \$10,000,000.

Newfoundland Ship Founders In Fog As It Nears Home Port

Caribou Strikes On Iron-head Cliffs Off Mouse Island, Newfoundland—Passengers And Crew All Saved.

(Canadian Press)

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Aug. 12.—Both tennis singles championship of New Brunswick will stay in Fredericton this year as a result of victories for Jack Babbitt and Miss Dorothy Feeney in the mens' and ladies' singles finals of the Provincial Tournament. This morning on the Rothesay Tennis Club Courts, Babbitt repulsed Jim McAvity, youthful Rothesay ace to retain the title he won last year at Newcastle, while Miss Feeney turned in the best tennis of her career to dispose Miss Margaret Henderson of Rothesay as the champion lady player of New Brunswick.

The ship buffeted the storm until the early morning, when she struck hard and fast on the hazardous shoals at Mouse Island. Heavy seas broke over her and water poured into her holds through the jagged holes made by the reefs. Boats were manned and the crew and passengers headed for safety and according to latest despatches the last boat made shore at noon, today, after eight hours battle with the elements.

The Caribou carried a crew of 44 officers and men, also 45 passengers, 200 sacks of mail and 10 cars of mixed freight. Although the ship will be a total loss, it is expected some of the mails will be salvaged when the weather moderates.

The steamer was built at Schiedom, Holland, in 1925, for the Newfoundland Government at a cost of \$250,000. She was strengthened for navigation in ice, which proved a menace while crossing the Cabot Strait. She was 1362 net and 2222 tons gross, 266 feet long, 41 beam and 23 feet deep. Registered in St. John's Nfld.

The loss of the Caribou at this period of the tourist season is a severe blow, but it is expected another steamer, the Glenoe, will be pressed into immediate service.

The sudden storm which came up Saturday evening has played havoc among the fishing boats along the coast. Small craft were carried from their moorings and many fishing ports report serious damage sustained as a result of the storm. Uneasiness is felt for the safety of two vessels that sailed Saturday with coal cargoes, the Ironhead, Captain Cluett for Bonne Bay, Nfld., and the Village Leaf, Captain Glasgow, for St. Pierre. Both of these vessels were laden down with coal and would be sailing in the teeth of the storm enroute. No word was brought here up until a late hour Sunday and grave fears are felt for the safety of the crew.
