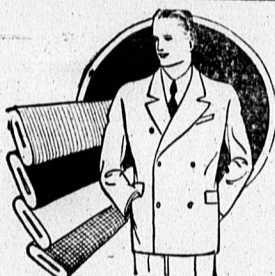

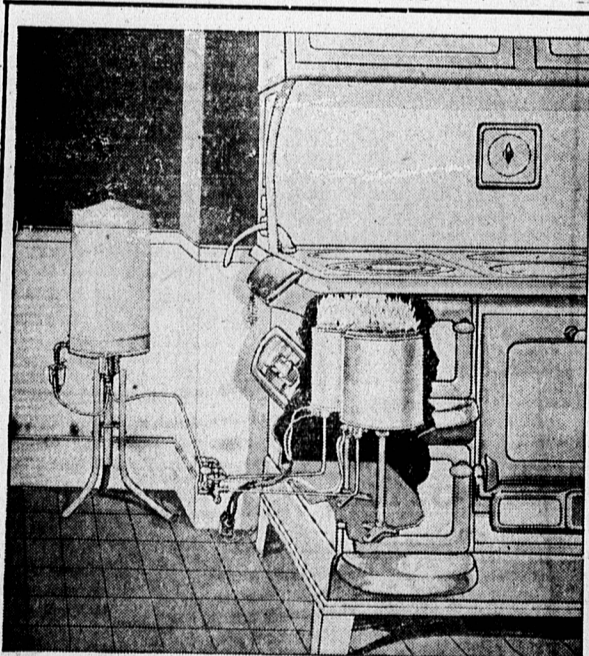

NEIL BETHUNE JOHNSTON 1851-1931

It is our sad duty to relate the passing of one of the oldest and most respected residents of the Peters Road district, in the person of Neil B. Johnston. While deceased had been ailing since early last fall from a malady that seemed to be difficult to diagnose, he had recovered sufficiently to go about the house and take his place in many ways, till the fatal stroke of paralysis seized him on rising from the evening meal on Tuesday, the 17th of February. FEAR DESTRUCTIVE COMPETITION

EDMONTON, Alta., March 4.—(By The Canadian Press)—There are several objections to the proposals of the \$5,000,000 company formed in the east to finance mixed farming on a large scale, Hon. George Hoadley, provincial minister of agriculture, declared here recently.

Farmers who are financed in this way will go on the market, the minister predicted, in competition with those purchasing livestock with their own means and will thus provide destructive competition and unnecessary expense to those financing independently. In addition, the company may find itself supporting farmers who cannot pay their obligations, the minister stated.

As an example of the danger of the adoption of mixed farming as a universal policy, hog production which was down 14 per cent in 1930 may easily be 300 per cent greater in 1931, he forecast.

ARCHITECTS PLAN ATTACK ON UGLY BUILDING OF U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The American Institute of Architects is planning an attack on ugly buildings at their source—in blue prints rather than in finished structures.

The institute will urge the formation throughout the country of architects' advisory councils to pass upon the quality of buildings before construction begins.
