Oshawa Wins Eastern Junior Championship

TORONTO, April 11—(CP)—Oshawa Generals have rolled another title off the assembly line. With machine-like precision, Generals smashed Montreal Canadiens 9-1 here Saturday night to take the Eastern Canadian junior hockey championship in three straight games. It also marked the fifth time in six years that the Generals have advanced to the Memorial Cup final.

The master-mechanic in this latest Oshawa victory, as so often has been the case all season, was Red Tilson. The entire Oshawa team functioned like a well-oiled machine. But that didn't stop the red-headed centre star who began his puck-chasing in Regina, from being a stand-out on a team of all-stars. Tilson was outscored by linemate Ken Smith, but not outpointed.

Tilson collected two goals and four assists to bag almost a third of the 20 points compiled by the Oshawa team. Smith had three goals and an assist. And his four-point total was tied by Bill Ezinicki, who had two goals and two assists. Floyd Curry and Chuck Scherza each scored a goal, and the remaining points went to Frank Bennett, with two assists, and Ron Nelson and Ross Johnstone, with an assist apiece. Bernie Lounz scored the only Montreal goal.

Vogel Wins Boston Marathon Warmup

BOSTON, April 11—(AP)—Teddy Vogel, a 17-year-old Watertown lad who had a four-minute head start, spurred the final 400 yards Saturday to win the 33rd annual Cathedral Club 10-mile road race, often used as a warmup for the Boston Athletic Association Marathon.

Among the contestants was Sgt. Gerard Cole of the Canadian Army and of B. A. A. He finished fourth. Cole, from Ste. Hyacinthe, Que., turned in an elapsed time of 53:24 and a corrected time of 51:24.

Quebec Sea Gulls Overwhelm Petawawa

QUEBEC, April 11—(CP)—Quebec Sea Gulls, provincial intermediate champions, overwhelmed Petawawa Grenades, Ontario titleholders, 15-3 today in the opening game of their best-of-five series for the eastern Canada title. The second game will be played here tomorrow night.

The Ontario champions were little match for the Quebecers, who went into a 2-0 lead in the first period and then boosted their margin to 9-1 in the second. The homesters outscored the visitors six goals to two in the final frame.

Sponsored by the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L. five big night's of entertainment gets underway at the Sporting Club tonight with Dancing, Bingo and Boxing being scattered over the week's program. But the big attraction—of course it will be all sports—comes on Thursday night when seven boxing bouts will be staged between members of the air force, army and navy stationed in Island centres.

Although the bouts will not be on such a large scale as the other inter-service scraps nevertheless interest is at a high pitch both among the civilians and members of the forces with the Tommy Claybourne-D. Gasson six round engagement already being widely discussed and many varying opinions are being expressed as to the outcome.

It is more or less a comeback that Claybourne, now stationed at the local basic training centre is making. Before the outbreak of war Tommy was one of the best, if not the best mitt-wielders taking part in the bouts put on by Promoter Joey McDonald. He was always willing to take on all comers regardless of weight or size and invariably win, lose or draw he put up a great scrap.

A smooth, clever boxer packing plenty of punching power in either mitt and any amount of courage Claybourne packed the fans on every appearance. Although taking part in many great scraps fans still remember vividly his several meetings with "Tiger" Hennessey a big bludge buster that hailed from the United States.

The bouts between this pair of fighters were always tough, gruelling and bloody battles. There is nothing between them and from the opening gong until the final one it was really a survival of the fittest and some hostilities then and Claybourne domped a uniform.

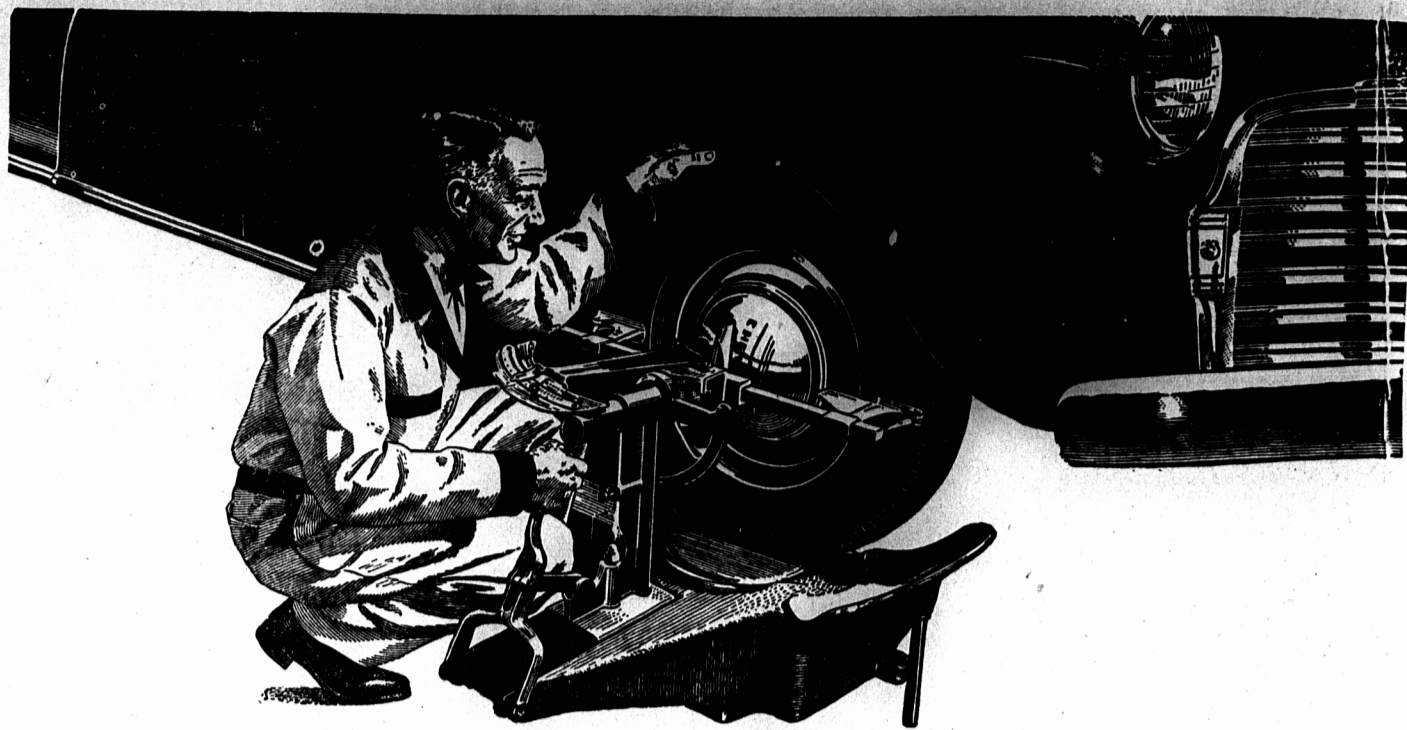
Nothing in a fighting way was heard about him until here on the occasion of the inter-service scrap. Transferred here shortly before C. A. Bourne got right back into ring logs and although dropping a few in at the time to the opponent he faced, Friday night put up a whole of a scrap although obviously not having time to get into his real fighting condition.

Since that time however Claybourne has been training hard and regularly with an eye to getting a return engagement with the Air Force boy. But now his punching is becoming sharper and harder with his clever footwork also improving vastly. Gasson will meet a better boy Thursday night and it should be a whole of a scrap.

Mind you this Air Force lad knows his way around the ropes too. In every appearance here he has been getting better and better. A smart, crafty boxer he packs plenty of weight in his wallop and if the pair forget about the finer parts of the game and start slug-fests fans will witness a gruelling battle of fists with the odds favoring a finish to the scrap long before the sixth round rolls around.

The other bouts on the card also promise plenty of action and hard-hitting action of the Army and Gate of the R. C. A. F. In a five round engagement with Brown of the Air Force and McDougall of the Navy also tussling in a five rounder. In addition there are four other bouts on the card that should wind up a great night of mitt-slinging.

Prince of Wales and S.D.U. are at present engaged in a great scrap for the Intermediate basketball title. Saints hold a 2-1 edge in the games played to date and lead the best out of five series in three games with but a minute to go in the third encounter when P.W.C. rallied to win out in the last few minutes and send the series to a fourth game.

Allan Cup Series May Start April 19

WINNIPEG, April 11—(CP)—Frank Sargent of Fort Arthur, President of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, announced here today that the best-of-five Allan Cup final would probably start here Monday, April 19.

Victoria Army won the western Canada championship here last night and meet the eastern champions, either Ottawa Commandos or Ottawa R.C.A.F. Commandos lead the best-of-five eastern play-off one game to none. The two played to a 6-6 draw last night. Even if the title is decided by Wednesday, the first Allan Cup final will not be played until Monday, Sargent said, because the winner would not arrive here until Saturday.

Sargent said the second game of the Canadian final would be played at Regina, either Monday, April 19, or Wednesday, April 21, with remaining games at Calgary.
