**THE LATE MR. PHILIP LARGE**

The allotted span of man's life is 70 years, yet by greater strength Mr. Large passed it by over a score of years. He was a native of this island and spent his life in Charlottetown, where he conducted an extensive and successful carriage building business, which in the past was one of the island's most important industries. Fifteen years ago, when quite advanced in years, Mr. Large retired from active life and handed the business over to his sons, who have been carrying it on ever since. Until a year ago, Mr. Large enjoyed excellent health and then it was noticeable that he was failing. He steadily weakened and at last after an unusually long and worthy pilgrimage here, his soul took its flight to Him who gave it. He was a prominent member of the Methodist Church, and also served the city in his capacity, for some years, at the City Council Board, and was one of the Assess-

**ABEGWEITS WIN FROM DORCHESTER**

**On Good Ice and Before a fair Attendance for Saturday Night Game, the Abegweit in Quick Succession and Once Again Came out on the Long end of a 6 to 2 Score.**

Last night was the first time that the hockey fans of Charlottetown witnessed a league game on a Saturday night, this was due owing to the boat being delayed in crossing and the Dorchester team having to fulfill their engagement in Summerside on Friday night.

For a Saturday night game there was a fairly good attendance and Dorchester staged a surprise to the fans by holding the fast skating Abegweits down to a no score in the first period and succeeding in leaving the ice in the second period one goal in the lead, 2-1.

In the third period the Abegweits came back strong and shortly after play opened up they struck their scoring stride and not till they had the safe margin of 6-2 did they let up.

There was only two penalties handed out, both in the last period, a few in the first periods would have made the play a little faster and there would not have been cause for so much whistle.

The game got away at 9:25, J. S. Herrill handling the whistle and Dorchester tried their best to beat Morgan out on some long shots, all of which were easily turned away.

Rodd, McEachern, Gordon, Moore and Roy Prowse, making some nice runs and going to Gaudet, the Dorchester net man for some hot ones which were carefully handled and turned aside, Drillir, H. Billiveau and LeBlanc made some nice individual rushes, but could only get a few weak shots to Morgan, Gormier and F. Belliveau made good end to end rushes but could not penetrate the Abegweits defence.

The play was slow at times and practically no combination was visible the period ending 0 to 0.

The second period was somewhat faster and got away at 9:57, and two minutes later H. Belliveau on a pass from LeBlanc behind the Abegweits goal got by Morgan for the first count.

From the face-off Dorchester pressed the Abegweits and R. Prowse with Rodd went down the ice, Prowse passing to Rodd who goes by Gaudet on one of his effective wing shots, evening the score.

At Charlottetown for a considerable time.
