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JR. ABBIES DEFEAT MONCTON HAWKS 10-6

Capitalize On Penalties Handed To Visitors In First Period Of Game

Junior Abbeys, keeping intact their undefeated season's record last night sent the visiting Moncton Hawks down to a 10-6 defeat in an exhibition game played at the Forum.

Paced by the brilliant performance of their first string centre, "Tarky" Whitlock, the local youngsters, taking advantage of penalties to the visitors in the first few minutes of the game, built up an 8-3 lead as the squads shot eleven goals in the opening session; outscored the Hawks 2-1 in the middle canto and then, as they protected their big lead were forced to see the losers shut them out 2-0 in the final session.

Fast and wide open all the way, fans who like plenty of scoring certainly had their fill of it. Scoring in the first minute of play Hawks set the Abbies back on their heels until the locals had equalized it three minutes later. And it was three minutes later that the scoring deluge came and Abbies accounted for their wide margin. Foremost among the scorers for four minutes straight after drawing three penalties in a row Hawks found themselves trailing 6-1 with the period only 8 minutes old as the Abbies, showing a passing wizardry and goal-getting ability that few in the rink thought they possessed, rammed in five goals in two minutes and 26 seconds. Back at full strength the visitors gamely fought back but the best they could do was split four goals with the locals before the bell ended the highest scoring first period ever witnessed on Forum ice.

32 seconds from the start of the game Legere, defenceman, passed the puck to the Hawks' lead as he blasted a wicked drive behind Davis from well out on left wing, just after the Abbies had been robbed of a sure goal by Mellich in the Hawks' nets. Mellich stopped Whitlock in the same manner a minute later but when "Tarky" went in close on nose from MacEachern at the three-minute mark he made no mistake on the equalizer. As Legere, Carpenter and Thompson went to the cooler for tripping, charging and holding within seconds of each other Abbies received their big chance and were quick to take advantage of it with Whitlock, Darragh, Flannigan and Blaquiere doing the scoring on plays that gave the Moncton goalie no chance.

With the teams back at full strength Carroll scored the second Moncton goal, but the Hawks' attack with Carpenter, but a little better than a minute later Whitlock shot his third counter of the period, straddling his way brilliantly through the visitors' defence to outwit the net guardian with a high drive. Still shooting goals thick and fast the Hawks came back 21 seconds later to account for their third goal, Legere getting his second counter on a pass from Kelly. Mellich's only score of the period came with but 25 seconds of the period left to play when Barton took MacEachern's pass at the edge of the crease to beat the Abbie goalie easily.

For fourteen minutes of the final period neither team could score a goal. Both teams were tiring from the fast pace and as a result the hockey was ragged in spots, but before the session ended Hawks had snatched the only goal of the period, Carroll taking a pass from Carpenter, the former hooking the

"I've had lots of fun as a ball-player and I am sorry it's all over," he said. "Somebody's going to knock them down eventually," Cochrane said, "and it may be as well to be in it now. We're in swell shape to do the job, if we get the pitching."

"Say!" Cochrane grinned. "I've got 17 pitchers coming to camp and Lakeland and we ought to develop something out of the newcomers."
