## Montreal Exchange

MONTREAL, July 15—(CP)—Industrial, mines, papers and oils retreated on the stock market today and only a few issues were able to advance against the general downward tendency of trading.  
 Losses up to a point were registered among industrials, heaviest losers being Canadian Car preferred, Steel of Canada preferred and National Steel. Losses were posted by Dosco "B" General Steel Wares and International Bronze Powders preferred.  
 International Nickel and Noranda slipped in late deals in mines, while newsprints were unsteady all day, issues being Price Brothers, Bathurst "A" and St. Lawrence Corporation, Imperial and International Petroleum both lost ground in the oil transactions.  
 While Bell Telephone dropped two points, in the utility department, Shawinigan and British Columbia Power "A" edged forward modestly. C.P.R. won a fraction advance, in rails. But Canada Steamship was behind, in carriers.  
 Wabasso headed a group of weaker miscellaneous issues, others dropping being Distillers-Seagram and Imperial Tobacco.  
 Total sales: 8,900 shares; Industrials, 5,100; Mines, 8,800.

## Finance

NEW YORK, July 15—(AP)—The buying tide ran to rails and industrial specialties in today's stock market, with many so-called leaders drifting through a narrowly irregular channel.  
 Canadian stocks showed a mixed trend. Dome Mines and Brazilian Traction gained 1-2 and International Nickel 3-8. Distillers Seagram lost 1-2, Walkers 1 per cent and Walkers preferred lost 1-8.  
 Trends were a bit spotty from the start but plus signs were in the majority at the close. Of 78 issues appearing on the ticker tape, 366 were up, 214 down and 218 unchanged.  
 The Associated Press average of 60 stocks held a net advance of 2 of a point at 43 7/8 and was at the best level since January. Dealings expanded in the forenoon and slowed after mid-day. Transfers of 702,900 shares compared with 563,830 yesterday.  
 Posting new 141 tops were J. I. Case, International Harvester, Caterpillar Tractor, Southern Railway, Atlantic Coast Line, Savage Arms, General Steel Castings pfd and Budd Mfg pfd.  
 U.S. Steel, Bethlehem and Chrysler ended at Monday's final marks. General Motors was up a shade, as was Republic Steel. On the losing side were U.S. Rubber, United Aircraft, Westinghouse, Du Pont, Standard Oil (NJ), American Smelting and Philip Morris.

## LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, July 15—(CP)—Cattle receipts on the Montreal livestock market totalled 929 today with all prices firmer. Other receipts: calf 564; sheep and lambs 271; hog 609.  
 Hogs were 25 cents higher and calves 25 to 50 cents higher.  
 Cattle were mostly cows and common bulls. A few good quality sold around \$6.50 with common to medium butcher cows from \$4.75 to \$6.25. Canners and cutters were \$3.50 to 4.50 and common bulls \$4.30 to \$5.75.  
 Veal calves ranged from \$8 to \$10.50. Good veals made \$9 to \$10.50, and medium kinds around \$9 to \$9.50, with the bulk of commoner kinds between \$8.25 and \$9.50. Drinkers were \$7 to \$8 and light grassers mostly \$6 to \$6.50.  
 Good ewes and wethers were \$13, buck lambs \$12 and culls \$11. Sheep were from \$3.50 to \$6.50 with a few yearlings up to \$8.  
 Hogs were stronger at \$15.25 for B-1 dressed, \$11.50 for B-1 alive fed and watered and up to \$11.75 off trucks delivered. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$6.50 to \$9.50 live weights.

## Grain

CHICAGO, July 15—(AP)—After dropping about a cent a bushel due to hedging sales and reports of serious congestion of wheat supplies at some terminals, wheat prices today rallied to recover all of the loss.  
 Wheat closed unchanged to 1-8 lower compared with yesterday, July \$1.03 7/8, September \$1.05 1/2—5/8; corn 1-8 off to 1-8 up, July 73 1/4—5/8, September 75 3/8; oats 3-5/8—1/2 lower.

WINNIPEG, July 15—(CP)—Wheat futures prices recovered fractional losses on Winnipeg grain exchange today, with light scattered bid buying, minor short covering and lack of offerings giving a firm appearance. Close wheat quotations were 3-4/8 cents higher, July at 75 1/2, Oct. 77 5/8 and Dec. 79 cents a bushel.  
 Good support in the October positions of oats and barley featured coarse grain trading. Buenos Aires was unchanged.

## CURRENCIES

NEW YORK, July 15—(CP)—The pound sterling at \$4.03 9/4 gained 1/4 of a cent in relation to the United States dollar and the Canadian dollar held unchanged at 11 3/4 per cent discount in today's foreign exchange trade. Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09—9.91 per cent discount.) The Hong Kong and Shanghai dollars closed at 24.64 and 5.42 respectively showing only a slight increase. The Argentine peso closed at 23.35.

## SPECIAL PRIZES FOR DRIVERS AND OWNERS

A special ribbon will be given to the owner of the winning horse in each race. THE MACDONALD TROBACCO COMPANY OF MONTREAL has donated a beautiful Trophy, known as the British Consols Trophy, which will be awarded to the Driver scoring the most points during the meeting. This Association will also give \$20 to meet. First place counts five points, second place three points, third place two points and fourth place one point. \$10 will be given the driver driving the fastest heat trotted during the meet and \$10 to the driver driving the fastest heat paced during the meet.  
 Ten Dollars will be given the caretaker of the horse trotting the fastest heat and Ten Dollars to the caretaker of the horse pacing the fastest heat.  
 Five Dollars will be given to the caretaker of each horse winning a race in the trotting and pacing classes during the meet.  
 Fifty Dollars will be given to the owner of the horse that beats track pacing record of 2:05 1-2 except as provided for below. Fifty Dollars to the owner of the horse that beats the track trotting record of 2:07 3-4 except as provided for below. In case two horses beat the above records then the awards go to the fastest horse. If two horses tie for the awards the money will be divided equally.

## GENERAL CONDITIONS (ALL RACES MILE HEATS)

The Charlottetown Race Track is now one of the fastest, best laid out and cared for tracks, and surely the most beautifully situated of any in the Maritimes Provinces. A great deal of effort will be made to keep it in apple pie order, all through the period before the races and during the races so that no horse will become unsound or suffer injury and to enable them to make fast time.

Horsemen (providing they are racing exclusively at our meeting) by wiring at our expense notifying us of their arrival will be met at the train and their baggage transferred to the grounds without cost to them, also taken away without cost to them. Every effort will be made to make the horsemen's stay pleasant and send them away feeling that they have been well treated.

All races to be raced on three heat plan: 10 per cent of each purse will be awarded to the winner. The remainder will be divided into three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of there being three heat winners they shall have a fourth heat to determine the winner.

All purses divided 40, 30, 10 and 12 per cent. Entry fee 5 per cent. Five per cent of the money raised for each heat will be deducted from the first and second horses; 1 per cent from the third horse and 2 per cent from the fourth horse. Entrance fees and deductions do not apply to Futurities.

Six horses to enter and four to start.  
 Rights reserved to change program, reject any entry, or if entry appears to lay over the field to the extent that there is not, in the opinion of the management, sufficient competition, then the said entry may be transferred to a faster class or entry fee refunded, but any driver and to declare race off on account of bad weather, or failing to obtain satisfactory number of entries or starters to transfer horses to another class to which they are eligible, re-open or substitute another without advertising, or alter or extend racing dates.
