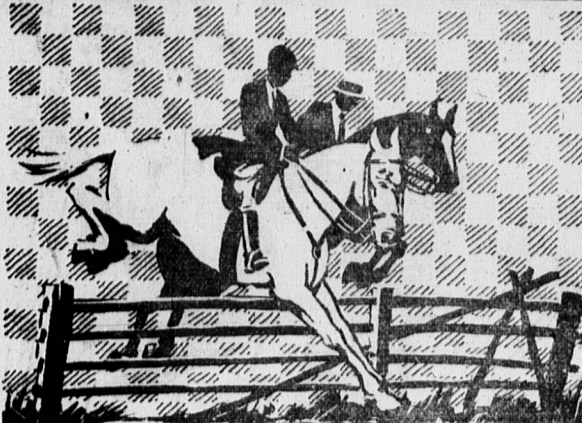

Dr. W. J. P. McMillan Speaks On Draft Address

DR. McMILLAN: My hon. friend does not seem to be so well versed in this subject as he was the other day. I think the Attorney General will have sufficient to attend to his own department. Let him confine his activities to that department and he will find ample work there. The Leader of the Opposition stated the other day that for the first time that he remembers in the history of this Province the Attorney General withdrew a case from the Petit Jury after it had been reported on by the Grand Jury. That is the case to which my hon. friend made reference a minute ago. That is an entirely different thing.

HON. MR. SAUNDERS: And after my explanation would you have withdrawn it or not, had you been Attorney General?

DR. McMILLAN: Would I?

HON. MR. SAUNDERS: Well, I am not in a position to judge of the legal merits. I didn't read the evidence. If you submit the evidence to me I will give you an opinion on it. I submit that the Grand Jury read the evidence, and I think the opinion of the Grand Jury, which is an old and established institution under the British Empire, is worth something. If they considered that the case should go on there must have been something in it. But there was something else connected with that matter. Certain judgments, I understand, were handed down which made it useless to go on with that case, and so the scheme unravels a little further. It shows that those laws for the enforcement of Prohibition over which the Dominion Government have jurisdiction are not yet perfect either. We have had several examples of that, of cases which looked good, of cases which were brought to trial and which were lost. Is that the reason why this case was withdrawn, on account of those judgments? Was it considered useless to go on with the evidence and try a case which would eventually be thrown out of Court? That may be the explanation, but if it is about time, as the Premier used to say himself—that some one woke up. If that is the kind of Prohibition laws that we have in effect in this country, both at Ottawa and in our own Province, that when a man is arrested and properly arraigned he has to be let go because the law is not going to convict him,—then there is something wrong somewhere. However, the country is paying the expense of it.

POULTRY NOTES

FOR HEALTHIER CHICKS

WAGE WAR ON WORMS AND DISEASE is a good slogan for all poultrymen to adopt. We suggest six "Words to the Wise":

1. HATCH OR BUY CHICKS EARLY is the first. Figures from the farm egg laying contest for five years show that chicks hatched before May 15th produced 75 eggs the first six months from November to May, and those hatched after May 15th produced 65 eggs for the same period.

2. KEEP BROODER HOUSE CLEAN. The steps suggested for cleaning a brooder house thoroughly are:—first scrape the floor, thus removing all accumulated droppings and litter; second, sweep the ceiling, wall and floor; third, scrub the floor fourth, clean all brooding equipment and fifth, after the house is dry, spray with an approved disinfectant.

3. PROVIDE CLEAN RANGE OR CONFINEMENT. By clean range is meant ground on which no chickens have been raised for at least a year, and where no poultry manure has been scattered for at least two years.

4. KEEP THE OLD AND YOUNG STOCK SEPARATED. Do not let the youngsters come in contact with the laying stock which may be carrying the germs of coccidiosis and roundworm, while being apparently healthy.

5. BUILD SCREEN MANURE PIT. This will gradually eliminate the common fly which is a fruitful source of worm infestation.

6. CLEAN DROPPING BOARD DAILY. From May to October droppings should be cleaned from the boards and placed in the screen manure pit, or some place where poultry will not have access to same.

"The same thing will be done in Canada when this is brought to the attention of our producers. Practically all dirty and stained eggs can be eliminated by keeping the pens clean and supplying plenty of straw for nests.

"Unfortunately, there seems to be a growing practice of washing dirty eggs or wiping them with a damp cloth. This practice should be discouraged in every way possible, as while a dirty egg may be washed without any bad results if it is consumed within a day or two, the moment an egg is washed the protection which nature has provided in the egg shell is removed, and bacteria immediately attacks the contents of the egg, and in a remarkably short time it is unfit for consumption. Washed eggs can usually be detected, and when they are stored they invariably come out unfit for consumption. As an experiment, a few years ago we exposed a few dozen eggs which were washed, and over 90 percent of them were either black rots or spots when they were taken out of storage.

"The consumption of eggs in Canada is the highest per capita in the world, but this consumption can still, and will be increased further, and we believe the producer of high quality eggs has nothing to fear, providing he gives proper care to his

flock, supplies good clean food, clean water, clean pens, and clean nests. His investment will yield good returns for him."

ONTARIO FIRM PROVES WASHED EGGS IN STORAGE BECOME TOTAL LOSS

"There is no doubt whatever but that the principle of the grading of eggs and paying the producer according to the quality purchased, is sound," stated H. S. Johnston, managing director of Flavettes Limited, Lindsay, in a recent interview. "It necessarily will take a little time to get this principle into practice, but quality is fast becoming the key to the successful selling of all food products, and there is no food product where this applies more than eggs."

"A striking example of this is the increased demand for Irish eggs in England. Up until a few years ago very little attention was paid to the production of eggs in Ireland. The hens were not properly housed and there was little or no provision was made in the way of clean nests, with the re-

sult that all Irish eggs were stained and dirty. During the past two or three years this condition has been changed entirely. Clean houses and clean nests have been provided, and the Irish eggs are commanding practically top prices on the English market."
