CONFLICT IN ICY ARENA

The Abegweits Receive their First Defeat by a Charlottetown Team.

THE MATCHES WITNESSED BY HUNDREDS.

The Playing in the First Match was Rather Slow and Unnecessary Roughness Displayed—Victorias Defeat the Abegweits by a Score of 6-3.—In the Intermediate Match the Abegweits Defeated Victorias 10-4.—The Goal Nets Used for First Time.

The Hockey season was ushered in auspiciously at the Hillsborough Rink last night, when the Senior and Intermediate Abegweits crossed sticks with the Senior and Intermediate Victorias. The large attendance, the enthusiastic applause and the keen interest manifested throughout the games augurs well for the success of hockey during the present winter. The matches, however, furnished genuine surprise to followers of the game. For the first time in the history of their Club the Senior Abegweits were

defeated by the Victorias six goals to three, and the Intermediate Abegweits turned the tables on their opponents 10 to 4.

There was the usual unnecessary delay in bringing on the Senior match and it was 3.15 when Referee Sullivan called the teams together. The Vics at once became aggressive and kept the Abegweits' defense moving. Their combination was much superior while the Abegweits depended more on individual work, some of their men not keeping their places as they should. From the outset it was evident that the Vics had the speedier team for almost immediately after the "face" they scored their first goal. From this until the close of the first half they had the advantage. Their shooting was more accurate, their combination was better, each man knew his place and he kept it. Abegweits rushed well but the referee called half time with the score four to nil for the Vics.

The second half was more interesting than the first. The Abegweits, though fighting against a heart-breaking score went in to win, but the Vics were on the defensive, and though the wearers of the red and black succeeded in scoring three goals, the Vics added two more to their score.

The game ended with the score standing six to three.

The game itself was rather slow for senior teams, but too much cannot be expected of an opening match. Some unnecessary roughness and tripping was indulged in by both sides and at times "shinny" took the place of genuine

hockey. It would be well for referees in future to penalize severely all attempts at unjust tactics for they doubtless detract from the pleasure of the spectators. An unpleasant jelay occurred between the Senior and Intermediate games. The latter was fast and interesting and in this respect superior to the Senior match. The Abegweits forwards were lighter than their opponents but they were faster skaters and better scorers. In the first half the Vics scored two, while the Abegweits tallied three. In the second half Abegweits

made 7 and the Vics 2, making the score: Abegweits 10, Victorias 4.

The goal nets were in position for the first time, and proved satisfactory in every respect, their being no disputes on the umpires' decisions.
