Future Of Times Seems Uncertain

LONDON, Aug. 21.—The entire Northcliffe newspaper organization and indeed all of Fleet Street, is absorbed in this one question today: "What disposition did the Chief make of his great property?"

For a long time it has been assumed he would leave all his newspapers, with the exception of the Times, to their respective staffs. But on what this assumption is based no one seems to know.

There is an even greater uncertainty about the fate of the Times. It is said that in 1907 Lord Northcliffe bought part of the Walters family's share in "The Thunderer" under an arrangement by which he had control only until he died or gave up the Times.

Early in the war, the publisher was reported to have negotiated with John Walters for the rest of his shares, but this deal did not go through. A few weeks before Lord Northcliffe was stricken at Cologne, it was understood he purchased all but a few of Walters' shares. But there seems to have been some dispute about the terms of sale.

Some opinions expressed in the newspaper world to-day declare the original agreement between Lord Northcliffe and Walters' the former was to offer his shares in the Times to Walters at the market price if he ever wished to give them up. Those in closer touch with the Northcliffe interests, however, say this stipulation was later cancelled.

Walters still owns the building and the site, Lord Northcliffe before the war paid about \$75,000 a year rent, but during the war this was cut to less than half. The directors of the Times now are: John Walters, Chairman; Campbell Stuart, vice-chairman; Wickham Steed, Hubert Walters, Murray Drumwell and Lint Smith. No one close to Lord Northcliffe is prepared to-day to even estimate the extent of his fortune. It has been roughly placed at between \$7,000,000 and \$8,000,000 but this is only a guess.

It has been generally known in Fleet Street that the Times was running at a loss, and Lord Northcliffe spared no expense to get news and develop its foreign service. The Daily Mail and Evening News have always been regarded as money makers, but the Weekly Dispatch, a Sunday paper is supposed to be a loser.

Italian Wields Razor In Scuffle

TORONTO, Aug. 21.—Edward Brakenberry, aged 30, who boards at 389 King Street, west, was admitted to the General Hospital last night, suffering from stab wounds behind the right ear and on the right arm, said to have been inflicted with a razor wielded by Joe Millgold, an Italian living at 51-1/2 Street, Millgold was locked up by constable Jackson at the Dundas Street West police station, on a charge of wounding and Brakenberry is under police surveillance at the hospital, as a material witness. The stabbing took place at Queen and Elizabeth Streets.

According to the police Brakenberry claims that while walking west on Elm Street, he was approached by Millgold and Italian friends, and the trio followed him to Elizabeth Street, where Millgold and Brakenberry clinched, in the scuffle Millgold is alleged to have used a razor on Brakenberry.
