BRITISH INDIA.

Some Government statistics recently printed give a lot of interesting facts about the British Indian Empire. British India and the tributary states under British control include 1,776,507 square miles and a population of 294,000,000. This past population is increasing rapidly having gained 41,000,000 within the past twenty years. British India has thus seven times as many people as the British Isles, and has gained in two decades as many inhabitants as there are in them.

In religious faith the great mass of the people are Hindus, of whom there are 207,000,000, with 62,000,000 Mohammedans. The Christians number pretty nearly 3,000,000 a gain of 700,000 within the past ten years. Of these 2,600,000 are native Christians. The Jews number only 18,000. The great mass of the people are illiterate, only some 17,000,000 being able to both read and write, while the number of children at school was last year but 4,882,981.

There are 763 municipalities in India and in the government of these the natives play an important part. Each municipality is ruled by a committee, the total membership of these committees being 10,207 of whom 8,892 are natives and 1,345 Europeans. The natives also hold many official positions. It is interesting to note that only £20,000 was expended last year for famine relief. In 1901 the expenditure on famine account was £1,000,000. Vast irrigation works instituted by the Government are steadily reducing the sufferings by famine.

The state railways of India are now a valuable asset, although but five years ago there was a heavy deficit in their separation amounting to £1,252,000. This was steadily cut down until in 1901 the net profit reached the handsome total of £800,000, the highest yet recorded. The outlook for the future of the state railway system is thought to be bright. The fact that India, with one fifth of the world's total population within its bounds is so little heard of in the news of the world these days is an evidence that its people are peacefully disposed and are fairly well content under the British flag.

A number of correspondents to Opposition newspapers are much exercised over The Guardian's independence. They are firmly convinced that all truly independent journals ought to support Mr. McCourt against Hon. Mr. Cunneen in the Fort Augustus election. To other minds that would look very much like partisanship. The Guardian courts the opposition of rabid partisans on both sides, and succeeds in obtaining it.

W. T. Anderson, representing a Toronto firm informs The Guardian that the commercial travellers' tax in Quebec does not apply to those representing business houses in Canada, but only to those representing British or foreign concerns. Mr. Anderson speaks from personal knowledge having recently made a business tour through Quebec and having had communication with the Quebec Government on the subject. The Guardian had fallen into error in this matter by adopting the views of the Toronto Globe and other leading Ontario journals which held that the Quebec tax applied to Canadian travellers.

Some time ago after investigating the adaptability of gasoline engines for use on short railway branches where the traffic is not heavy, Superintendent Sharp became convinced of their value and economy and recommended their adoption on the Vernon River and Montague Branches. An Ottawa despatch tells that the Railway Department has decided to try them. The experiment will be watched with much interest. From the results recorded elsewhere we are led to believe that in the open season of spring, summer and fall these engines will do the work admirably at a minimum cost. The heavier steam locomotives will always be available should they be needed to clear the track after winter storms.

WARSHIPS READY FOR CZAR'S FIGHT

LONDON, Nov. 14.—There is strong evidence of the danger of interference by Germany in case the revolutionary movement in Russia succeeds in a complete overthrow of the dynasty. The Czar has become aware of the disloyalty which now permeates every class of his subjects including the military and his own household. He is in such personal fear, and so distrusts even his personal associates he has arranged to flee if necessary, to German protection at a moment's warning.

A German torpedo boat is anchored opposite Peterhof, and is in wireless communication with the palace. There are also tenders equipped with wireless apparatus stationed at intervals in order to connect the German coast and Berlin. The Czar is in daily communication with the Kaiser by this route.

It is well understood that in case of necessity Emperor Nicholas will quickly sail for Germany, and it is generally understood that he will from there, with the assistance of the German army, attempt to subdue his empire. The danger of such an appalling eventuality is not imminent, but the fear of it as cabled a week ago is causing grave apprehension in this and other capitals.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Rev. Dr. Madison C. Peters, of the Baptist church, Madison avenue and Sixty-Fourth streets, speaking last night of the crime against the ballot, said:

"I have in my pocket the names of two men who voted four times each for a consideration last Tuesday. I know the witness. A well-known merchant, whose name is synonymous with integrity, told me that he had the name of a man who voted eighteen times. 'We have horses more intelligent than thousands who vote in this city. The outrages of Tuesday were attempts at the assassination of the republic.'
