At Bedouque Hall on Tuesday, the Cape Traverse Y.P.U. presentation "Calling All Carrs" placed first in competition with the Kelvin Grove Women's Institute play entitled "The Dummy". Both plays were the recipients of hearty applause and the adjudicators' remarks were awaited with eagerness by a capacity crowd.

Adding much to the enjoyment of the evening were readings by Mr. Crawford Picketts, solos by Mr. Harold Laird, and talks on the progress of Drama given by Mrs. Allison MacMillan, F.V.I.C. President, and by Mr. Clark of Freetown. The capable chairman was Mr. Ralph Callbeck.

The adjudicating committee, comprised of the Reverend Mr. Davies of Kensington and Mr. Frederick A. Large, K.C., of Charlottetown, had a difficult task in picking the winner of these two plays; yet, judging by the applause, their choice was a popular one with the audience. The margin of success was close, however, as only one mark's difference appeared in the scoring of the two plays.

Mr. Large announced that Miss Georgie Yeo had been chosen the "best actress" of the evening for her "perfectly natural" presentation of the part of Jane Maxwell in "The Dummy". The gentleman winning top honors as the "best actor" was Mr. Raymond Morrison. His capable interpretation of the role of Tommy Rand in "Calling All Carrs" elicited much praise from the adjudicators.

Commends Team-work

During his adjudicating remarks Mr. Davies said the team-work had been good in both plays. He advised against continuing dialogue while the audience was convulsed with laughter (as much of the continuity of the play might be lost during that time) and suggested a pause until laughter subsided and dialogue would be audible. Tribute was paid to behind-the-scenes personnel for sound effects, stage arrangements and properties, which were excellent. He and Mr. Large both thanked the groups for the privilege of taking part in the programme and complimented the directors and cast of both plays for their fine work.

On behalf of the Provincial Drama Committee, Mrs. Gates presented personal prizes to Miss Yeo and Mr. Morrison as the best actress and actor of the evening. A diploma was also awarded to the director of the winning play. A very pleasant evening was brought to a close when the ladies of Bedouque Women's Institute served refreshments to the performers and guests. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the ladies on behalf of those present by Mr. David Murphy. Many complimentary remarks were made concerning the evening's performance and much interest was expressed in the coming Provincial finals to be held in Charlottetown next week.
