MAKE TRIP TO HALIFAX—Messrs. R. E. Mutch, George J. Tweedy and D. P. Archibald, Directors of the Northumberland Ferries Limited, went by plane to Halifax, Saturday morning and after inspecting the car ferry Sankaty, returned to Charlottetown arriving here at 3:20 p.m. The same day the trip was made in a Canadian Airways plane with Pilot Stewart MacKinnon at the controls. Plans are made to have the boat undergo changes in construction immediately. It was learned last night. The design and layout of the boat appears to be suitable for the Wood Islands-Caribou route, the directors claim. The passenger accommodations are to be completely renovated. The boat carries 32 cars and 200 passengers. The service will commence May 1st next.

WAR CRAMPING COLOR STYLES

LONDON, Feb. 11 (CP)—Color restrictions predicted as a wartime measure to follow pooled rationing, already hinted at in official circles, will cramp the new season's styles in Mayfair. But dress designers are planning to meet the problem.

A Daily Mail writer says women choosing spring and summer wardrobes will find only about 12 pastel shades offering while men will have to make their selection from a meagre half-dozen colors.

The writer says the reason is economy in dyestuffs. "There has been a big demand since the war began for khaki, air force blue and navy blue. The dyeing section of the Yorkshire woolen manufacturing industry has therefore to turn fashion in the direction of shades more easily supplied. No color restrictions have been made yet but it is expected they will be enforced in the early spring."

First Thaw Of Season Hits Province

Islanders had the first taste of warm weather yesterday since the middle of January and the first thaw of any size this winter.

Early yesterday snow began falling, turning later to hail and last night, with rising temperatures rain began falling.

Streets in the city were inches deep in snow and water while sidewalks were turned into pools. Streams in some sections, despite the efforts of private citizens and city employees to improve conditions.

Two extra crews with heavy plows were put to work on the Charlottetown-Montague highway yesterday to widen cuttings and leave the road in good condition before the Hillsboro Bridge was closed. It was said.

Traffic over the bridge will be diverted to river ice for the next two weeks while the bridge is undergoing repairs. Officials in charge of the department feared the river ice would not support the passage of heavy plows. A small plow is stationed at Montague and is expected to keep the road open for the time the bridge is closed.

Meanwhile sportsmen interested in the fate of the Island's prairie partridge population were pleased with the turn in the weather. A good thaw, they believed, would bare natural food supplies and relieve the threat of starvation facing the "Huns" for several weeks.

Additional work would be available for the unemployed as a result of the thaw just as important as food.

Premier King Expresses Grief Of Dominion

OTTAWA, Feb. 11 (CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King tonight expressed the grief of Canada "at the loss of her adopted son who knew her ways and loved them."

In a broadcast over the national network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, in which Justice Minister Lapointe and Conservative Leader Manion participated, and in a separate press statement, the Prime Minister expressed the sorrow of Canadians.

After a busy evening in which he performed the sad duties of advising the King of Lord Tweedsmuir's death, initiated the preparations for Canada's part in the funeral ceremonies and attended the swearing in of Chief Justice Sir Lyman Duff as administrator of the government, the Prime Minister said he was "too deeply moved to make any personal statement."

On behalf of the people of Canada, the Prime Minister extended to His Majesty an expression of the Dominion's "profound sorrow."

Two Fishermen Lost At Sea

LUNenburg, N. S., Feb. 11 (CP)—The schooner Robert Knickle of the Lunenburg fishing fleet arrived in port Saturday and reported the loss of two crew members. Guy Howe, 40, and his dory mate Byron Conrad, 28, were drowned on the western banks of Halifax last Friday. Their capsized dory was located but no trace was found of the men.

Captain Allen Mosher of the Robert J. Knickle said he believed heavy sea struck the dory while the men were hauling in their trawls. Conrad was married last Christmas Eve.
