FAMILY KILLED IN THE WAR

Four Brothers, Wife, and Two Children.

LONDON.—Four brothers killed at the front; father-in-law and cousin killed also; and now wife and two children—the whole family—killed in the Folkestone air raid. Such is the tragic history of Corporal G. W. Moss, a young Canadian soldier, as told in the following letter from a chaplain at the front:

To the Editor of The Daily Mail:—Sir,—At the front we have read of cunning Cutbert, coddled consciences, and soulless strikers until we have become sick at heart.

Let the whole Empire hear of a young Canadian who has just been in my billet, and is leaving for England tonight.

Corporal G. W. Moss, of the Canadians, enlisted in Canada on August 8, 1914. He was sent with the first batch of Canadians to the front. He has been through the whole campaign, has been twice wounded, and three times back to the front from England. He is one of five brothers. The other four have all given their lives on the field of honor, and his cousin and father-in-law have fallen also.

Now, to crown everything, the corporal's wife and two young children—the whole family—have been killed in the great air raid in England.

He thus lost all, yet tonight stands calm and resigned in his duty in the righteousness of our cause and in the guiding hand of God.

The corporal's C.O. is a brick and has done all that a father could have done for him, and we shall look eagerly to see what the Empire has to say to one of its truest sons, whose father and mother, bereaved of all their other children, are anxiously watching day by day in Canada.

Before the war Corporal Moss was a captain in the Canadian Salvation Army, and his great desire is to become a chaplain.

U. S. ENTRY IN WAR UNSELFISH ACT

LONDON.—In recognition of his services as head of the British mission to America, an address was presented today to Foreign Secretary Balfour, by the Lord Mayor, Sir Wm. Dunn, at a notable Guildhall gathering. Mr. Balfour was thus honored in token of "the universal admiration felt by your fellow countrymen for the successful efforts you made to arrange grounds for common action and efficient co-operation between the American people and this country in the strenuous and determined efforts to put an end to the menace of German militarism and so preserve the freedom of the world and secure a just and abiding peace."

Mr. Balfour characterized the entry of the United States into the war as absolutely unselfish and the greatest step ever taken in the direction of accomplishment of the aims with which the City of London had always sympathized. He said the United States and England were the two countries most fitted for mutual comprehension, adding:

The result of the entry of the United States into the war is incalculable. It cannot be exaggerated, and will extend far beyond the possible duration of the war and reach to generations to come."

Tells of Hun Intrigue

Dealing with the change in German aims with the changing fortunes of war, Mr. Balfour asked his hearers to look at what German newspapers had said before the war and during the first successful weeks of the war, not at what the German papers say now.

Just before the war, he said, Germany tried to enter into a transaction with the British Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, to see on what terms England could be bought off. The Germans had the impudence to make the suggestion that if Germany was allowed a free hand in the war she would guarantee that French territory in Europe would not be diminished. When asked whether she would guarantee French colonial territory she replied: "No, we do not propose to guarantee French colonies."

Even a child could see what this meant. It meant that Germany, victorious, could impose what indemnity she liked and what terms of commercial treaties she liked.

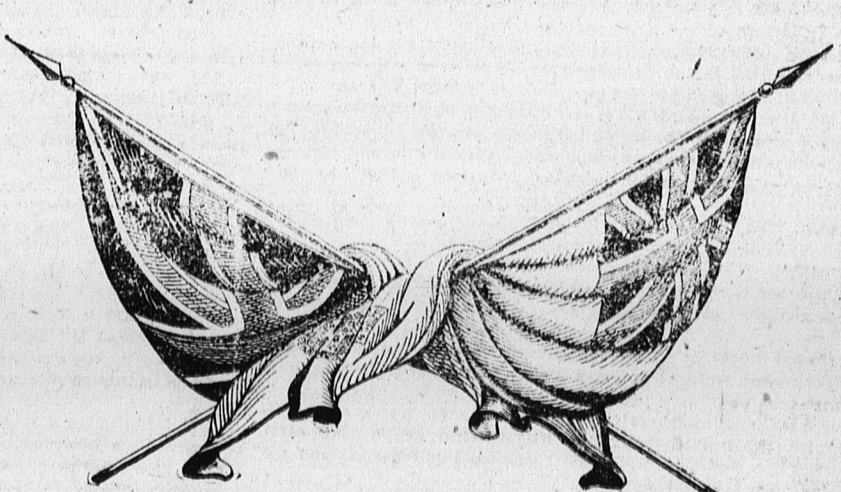
