Rangers Win 2-1 In Overtime Play

Patrick Snatches Victory For New York After Leafs Make Desperate Bid For Victory

(By Jack Calder) (Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, April 12—(Friday) (CP)—Murray (Muzz) Patrick did it again early today, scoring after 31 minutes and 43 seconds of overtime to give his father's New York Rangers a 2-1 victory over Toronto's Maple Leafs and a one-game advantage in the Stanley Cup finals.

Manager Lester Patrick's younger son broke up the fifth contest of hockey's world series shortly after midnight by battling Neil Colville rebound past goalie Turk Broda on a break from the wild-ly-attacking Maple Leafs. It was the same Patrick who broke up the fifth game of the Rangers' semifinals with Boston's National League champions by firing the only goal.

The crowd in Maple Leaf Gardens, held to 13,694 customers by a snowstorm, was prepared to sit through its next when the silver-haired Colville brought Broda to his knees. Patrick, whose minor penalty a few moments before had almost cost his team the game, coasted in from the left boards to lift the puck over Broda.

Toronto gambled and lost. Manager Conny Smythe and Coach Dick Irvin elected to send four first players into the fray in place of men who had struggled through the Leafs' victories in the third and fourth contests of the best-of-five series and they almost swung the verdict.

Billy Taylor and Don Metz, just back from finishing the International-American League finals with Pittsburgh, started on the forward line in place of Robert (Red) Heron and Dave (Sweeney) Schriener. Reg Hamilton and Wilfred (Bucko) McDonald were on the defence instead of Captain Red Horner and Jack Church.

But at least four of the Leafs were left fresh for Saturday's battle, when the Toronto club can pull level on its home ice and force the round to a seventh and deciding game.

Several of the Rangers were dog-weary at the end and Alex Shibicky, who started despite a bad ankle that kept him out of the third game, was unable to finish. Shibicky was in long enough, however, to start the play that produced the Rangers' first goal. He passed to Mac Colville on a counter-attack and Mac gave the puck to his other wing as they swept around Hamilton, left alone on the defence.
