A Lawn Tennis club was successfully organized in Souris last week. The club comprises about forty members, and selected as their officers for the current year the following: President, Harry F. Brine, Vice president, Miss Rea McLean; Secretary, Miss Ella Mathew; Treasurer, George Sutherland. A magnificent site for a court was obtained, adjoining the residence of John McLean and overlooking the harbor. This was excellently laid off under the supervision of Harry F. Brine. The opening of the court took place Friday evening. It was largely attended, and thoroughly enjoyed, much of its success being due to the efforts of Miss Clarke, Miss Seaman, Mrs. (Dr.) Marven and Mrs. Ferguson, and who well deserved the thanks accorded them, for the bountiful spread which they provided for those present. After spending a pleasant evening the company fervently sang "God Save the King." The Lawn Tennis Club is a splendid addition to the healthy out-door recreation of Souris, and judging from enthusiasm of the members its present popularity is not likely to decline.

MESSRS. Drummond and Simpson had a well filled hall at their two first Institute meetings at East Point on Wednesday last. Mr. Drummond in the afternoon spoke on the Dairy Cow with charts to illustrate. In the evening he discussed soil cultivation and feeds and feeding, illustrated by charts showing the composition of the different stock feeds produced on the farm. Mr. Simpson's address in the afternoon was on dairying, with special reference to quality in the product. In the evening his subject was, how can we keep more of our young people on the farm and in the country. Mr. Simpson's argument was that if we would make our farmsteads more attractive and our country more beautiful by cultivating ornamental trees and growing fruit it would be a great means of keeping young people at home and giving them a taste for agricultural life. The country here is backward on account of the cold weather. crops are not making a good growth as could be desired. The blossoms are still on the apple and cherry trees. Father McIntyre is having a fine new barn erected on the farm in connection with the parochial building at St. Columba.

FROM letters received from Rev. G. P. Raymond in Denver, we are pleased to learn of the safe arrival in that city of the delegation to the great International Sunday School Convention. The letters team with such expressions as "Isn't it hot," "My but it is hot," "Don't need many clothes," "With I hadn't brought so many," etc. Denver is described as a very beautiful city with many very beautiful buildings and magnificent churches. The one in which the main meetings of the Convention are held cost \$180,000, and the organ cost \$30,000. The mountains, too, are grand and seem wonderful to one who never saw any before. A great number of delegates are in attendance, among them Prof. Hammil, and C. D. Meiggs both of whom are well known to S. S. workers in this Province. Several of the Canadian Provinces are represented. Mr. Raymond says they consider him quite a curiosity. "The delegates from little P. E. Island." "T's evident they think P. E. Island is somewhere in the vicinity of the North Pole." The delegates from Canada and the East generally, will put up a big fight to have the next session of the International Convention (1904) held in Toronto. Some want it to be in California, others in Portland, Oregon, while there are some who favor holding it in Jerusalem. Some of the delegates think Sunday School workers should know something about the Holy City. One of the Executive Committee, W. J. Smelroth, has a little more startling idea which he will suggest when the matter comes up. It is "that twelve of the strongest, most prominent men and women of the International, shall be chosen to leave San Francisco, together in the fall of 1903, six months before the opening of the World's Convention, and make a half tour of the world, preaching as they go. With guides and interpreters, they will travel through Corea, China, Japan, on to India and Australia, everywhere where the gospel is not plentiful, and then in the end conclude the triumphal journey at Jerusalem in time for the assembling of the World's Convention." It is whispered that John Wanamaker, the noted Philadelphia Merchant Prince and Sunday School Superintendent, may be President. There are also rumors that H. S. Alwater of Canon City, State President of Colorado, and Henry V. Johnson of Denver, will be candidates. Mr. Raymond tells of hearing an address on Sunday School work by a lady from Jerusalem. She gave a very fine address.

NEW INSURANCE RUNING.

BOSTON, June 30.—The attorney-general has rendered an opinion in which he cites that credit must be allowed for accrued interest on liens. This decision will increase the assets of the Mutual Reserve by \$280,000, the Provident Savings by \$52,000, and the Securty Mutual by \$600. The text is a distinct rebuff to the insurance department, which held otherwise.
