### Recollections of Sunderland (2)

There was a striking distinction between the dialect spoken on Tyneside and on Wea-side, notwithstanding that less than a dozen miles separated the rivers. The Northumbrian was the descendant of the Anglo-Saxon and the centuries had been powerless to take out the gutteral and the rough intonation from his speech. The Durham man had his Danish descent just as strongly marked in his dialect, which sounded rather flat to his northern neighbors. The urchins who acted as shoeblacks outside the Central Station, Newcastle, offered to "clean yer byuts, sor?" while his opposite number at Sunderland made it "cline yeh boots, shi?" It is not easy to write a dialect; for one thing our vowels are woefully inadequate. For instance the "i" in Cline is pronounced like the short "e" in net followed closely by the "y" in my. The schools frown on such a usage, and insist that "i" is ah-ee, but the children talk like their parents and so the dialect persists. As for hysm (home), myun (moon), and so on, the "y" is pronounced like "ee"—which is its sound in all the languages of antiquity. There is, for what is a dialect, a certain resemblance to the Sunderland twang in such words as "hyar" for here. The subject is very interesting, but doubtless, dear reader you've had enough.

### A Familiar Phenomenon

The familiar phenomenon of the North American opinion is now clear again," says Bruce Hutchinson, in the Victoria Times. "Having risen to a wild state of optimism a few weeks ago because the Japanese lost some aircraft carriers, it has now sunk down to something like 70 degrees below zero because of the disasters in Africa. One knew this would happen." Mr. Hutchinson inclines to lay the blame for American and Canadian instability upon the "constant parade of sensational matter over the radio, day in, day out; it is purely synthetic and man-made." He adds that the radio aggravates the jittery state complained of, but it was here before radio existed. There were at least two climatic causes concerned in this nervous tension. We live and move in a highly electrified atmosphere, which makes its peculiarity known by frequent thunderstorms and displays of aurora. Notice how the lower animals react when these phenomena are in the offing. Each has its own way of expressing nervous excitement. Then there are the extreme conditions of summer and winter. In summer we get an over-abundance of sunshine with all kinds of ultra and infra rays, and the mind and nerves are stimulated. Then, too soon, the sky darkens, the storm clouds lower, the snow falls, and for weeks we see no sun. Many forms of animal life go into a torpor; and man's spirit is chilled as much as his body. Day after day, year after year, and generation after generation, we are subjected to these two influences and the result is that we come into harmony with the flickle elements; unduly elevated at one time, too downcast at another. Such a hypothesis goes far to explain our enthusiasm for new projects which are soon discarded for something newer still. To some extent we can school ourselves to avoid our ways, but it requires much exertion of will and much perseverance.

### THE MYSTERY OF THE CAT

Charlotte C. West, M.D. (in Our Dumb Animals)

With the world in chaos and our own lives disrupted, it seems a far cry to ponder on the mysterious behavior of the domestic cat. Attention has been focused on the feline domestic in war torn London particularly because of its extraordinary actions under extreme difficulties. Many stories are being recounted of the seemingly occult knowledge of the ordinary cat; of those huddled together in underground shelters; those thrown out of their homes on the mercy of the felines, separated from their loved ones, but reclaimed by their cats.

In normal times, the average person says that the household cat had its liver, its milk, was put out at night, and — let it go at that. It has taken a horrible world calamity to bring to the fore the strange powers possessed by even the common alley cat.

Those of us who have been sufficiently interested in the behavior of cats, have been rewarded by a wealth of data which challenges one's imagination. However, strange as it may appear, the language of the feline has ever been a source of inspiration to poet and treatise. No animal in history is so honored. From time immemorial the cat has been silently ingratiating and amazingly intriguing.

So bewildering has been the conduct of the feline throughout the ages, that savants have devoted a good deal of time to investigating the pedigree of the cat in order to determine some explanation of its mysterious powers. However, the origin of the cat is hidden in remotest antiquity.

Our earliest knowledge of this extraordinary animal is gleaned from ancient Egyptian civilization. From ancient, for a high degree of culture prevailed in the remote times of the Pharaohs. At the height of Egyptian power animals were considered as being the near-est form of gods; the predecessors of the Egyptians in Egypt, and ordained to dwell in the afterworld where every Egyptian hoped to go after death.

The cult of the feline flourished in the ancient empire. The Egyptians' knowledge of embalming and their reverence for the cat, enabled them to preserve these ani-

### The Spreading Dogbane

A reader in the eastern part of the Island sends in a plant which is easily identified as the Spreading (or Tutsan-leaved) Dogbane, *Apocynum androsaemifolium*. Here is a brief description of the plant, drawn up last year:

Dogbane (*Apocynum*). A perennial herb with opposite entire leaves. Stem erect, branching. Leaves ovate or ovate, mucronate, pale beneath. Flowers in a 2's or campanulate, white or pink, in loose cymes; corolla 5-9 mm. long, not angled, the tube narrowed in the throat. (Entire means not serrate or toothed on the margin.)

Do you know if the Dogbane is harmful to stock. Well, I have noticed the plant growing plentifully in some districts but never heard of any injury being done to cattle by it. Its name seems to indicate that some part of it is "bane" or poison for dogs, but I can find no instance of its use as such.

However, Professor Peter Kalm, (1715 — 1779), a friend of Linnaeus, and a botanist who travelled a good deal in North America, noticed its properties as offensive to some persons, while to others it proved so noxious that the milky juice of the plant produced blisters on their hands; this happened to one individual who merely plucked a flower to show it to him. In some parts of North America it is called Ipecaca from its emetic qualities, but it is less active than Ipecacuanha.
