After the regular business was disposed of an hour was spent drafting a programme in connection with the afternoon tea to be given on the day of opening of the Legislature.

ICE DELAYS FERRY — The mainland train arrived in Charlottetown at 8.40 last night. Two hours and twenty minutes late. Most of the delay was caused by ice conditions in Northumberland Strait, it was said. The ferry S.S. Charlottetown experienced considerable difficulty from heavy drift ice while making a freight crossing in the afternoon. By evening, however, changed wind direction made the crossing easier.

PARENTS-TEACHERS MEET — The West Kent Parent-Teacher Association decided last night to supply milk daily to pupils in grades 1 to 5 and to as many more as they could. The meeting was held in the school at 7.30. The meeting heard an address by Dr. P. A. Freeman, Superintendent of the Provincial Infirmary on the control of tuberculosis. Stipendiary Magistrate K. M. Minard, president of the Association was chairman.

TRANSFERRED TO HALIFAX — Mr. Orrin D. MacGregor, Manager of the Imperial Oil Company, Charlottetown, has been transferred to Halifax and will leave for there this month. He will be succeeded here by C. H. Cerry of St. John's. Mr. MacGregor is a native of this province, has been in Charlottetown for the past seventeen years, and whilst he will receive congratulations on his well deserved promotion, at the same time there will be regret expressed at his departure of himself and family from this city.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETS — A conference would be held of Principals of Queen Square, Prince Street and West Kent schools with the manual training committee of the City School Board, it was decided at the regular monthly meeting of the Board yesterday afternoon. Chairman Dr. J. J. Yeo presided. Arrangements have been underway for some time to provide increased manual training for boys in city schools and the conference is aimed to work out details of the classes. Domestic Science for girls in city schools was also discussed yesterday's session of the Board. Hope was expressed that classes in that subject would be provided in three schools when the fall term opens next September.

AUDITORS BEGIN WORK — Messrs. D. P. Archibald, C. A., of this city and W. A. Morell, C. A., of Amherst, N. S., began their work on making an audit of Charlottetown's finances yesterday. Mr. Archibald had been doing preliminary work since last Thursday. The two chartered accountants had been engaged following an emergency meeting of the City Council last Tuesday when it was decided to prepare a financial report for the year ending January 15, 1939, and a statement of the assets and liabilities of the City of Charlottetown as to that date. The annual meeting of the Council would not be held until the auditors report had been made to the Council. It was announced last night Mayor E. A. Foster said he did not anticipate the meeting would take place for at least 30 days.

Daily Lenten Meditations "Self & Time Incorporated"

It is a blessed experience to attend us as we cast up in retrospect the accounts of Self and Time, Incorporated in our Lenten meditations. They will furnish for the most part ground for assurance rather than discouragement. If we have been mistaken in an excess of hope and trust the very excess has kept alive and in action the temper, the only temper, which can or will secure for generous hope and trust some victorious issue. Where we have been mistaken in our fears and despondencies, the better issue than we dared expect supplies new ground for courage and faith.

There is, I take it, a rarer outcome of having been often mistaken than any of these; just the dear-bought recognition that, having been mistaken before, we may be mistaken again. This will keep us from presumptuous pride and hard domineering ways. It is conducive to teachableness and sympathy with other mistaken people. If once you could get around any council-table people all of whom were willing to admit that they might be mistaken, you might entertain a livelier hope of the resolution of society's strains.

The supremely graceless person is the person who not only never admits that he has been mistaken, but believes it. For all that, though mistakes may be a means of grace, the wise man will seek in this brief period of prayer and fasting to be delivered from making any more than necessary and especially from making the same mistakes too often. For there is a point at which even mistakes cease to be either a grace or a means of grace.

The James Boys

EXTRACTS FROM A HISTORY OF THE LIVES OF THESE NOTED BANDITS

"The Life and Adventures of Frank and Jesse James" by Hon. J. A. Deans, published several years ago is supposed to be the most authentic account of the adventures of the two bandit brothers, and a reader kindly gave us the following review which is of interest in connection with the moving picture version being played here at the Prince Edward Theatre.

Dashing midnight rides to evade pursuit; of moonlight nights and meetings in lonely places; of desperate encounters with detectives, and hair-breadth escapes from arrest; the domestic life of the outlaws all find space in this book. The roughship, bloodstain, and marriage of Frank James to a beautiful and highly educated young lady, and her subsequent removal to his pleasant home on the frontier of Texas, affords a theme of romantic interest. The following extract relates how Annie Ralston became the outlaw's bride.

But there came a time when a shadow fell across her pathway, and eclipsed this star in the social firmament. Annie's father had been ardent in his attachment to the southern cause, and all who had contended in behalf of that cause were ever welcome to the hospitality of his home. He had suffered much from the consequences of the war, and perhaps more from the general convulsions which had engulfed and which had extended beyond the bounds of propriety. Frank and Jesse James with their confederates, became frequent visitors to the home. People said them there often, and it was whispered softly at first, but shouted aloud later, that pretty Annie Ralston was an attraction for the outlaws and that she might be delivered from making any more than necessary and especially from making the same mistakes too often. For there is a point at which even mistakes cease to be either a grace or a means of grace.

Whicher was helpless, for the other had him under cover of a pistol from the moment he came in sight. But Whicher was dauntless and wary, and without exhibiting the least trepidation, he said: "Who do you take me to be? What have I to do with Pinkerton or his business? I am a stranger in the country and want something to do. I don't see why you should keep that pistol pointed at me. I don't know you and have never done you any wrong."

"Oh, d—n it, you are the kind of a dog that speaks up and bites, are you? You will carry in the James boys, will you? You are a nice sneaking cur, ain't you? Want work, do you? What say you my sneaky?"

The taunting manner of Jesse James did not disconcert the detective. He answered these taunts with perfect coolness: "I don't understand you, sir. I am no cur, and knowing nothing of the James boys, I addressed you politely, and you did not return the same. I am a detective, and I am here to do my duty. You are a nice sneaking cur, ain't you? Want work, do you? What say you my sneaky?"

Together they took a train and proceeded to Leavenworth, Kan., where the boys which they had made to each other were renewed and sealed by legal authority, and fair Annie Ralston became the outlaw's bride, and with him she sailed across the yellow southern sea, where the sunlight is warm and the breezes balmy.

It was a sacrifice to thus launch herself from that society in which one of its brightest ornaments, it was a trial to surrender up her friends and associates of her girlhood, to be taken to a place so remote and so desolate; but she was heroic to cast herself upon the care of the man she loved. On the altar of her affection, therefore, she placed all the love of her life. In her devotion she proceeded to dig a wide, deep grave, in which to bury forever the images which she had cherished. And with Annie Ralston became the outlaw's wife.

Both the outlaws are married, and hands were successful in winning handsome and accomplished young ladies for brides. Each has a speciality, is a man of considerable wealth. But the pages of the book tell best how Jesse James and his confederates in their bloody affair learned that Whicher was a detective and because he was a detective they deliberately murdered him.

The following extracts from the long campaign waged by the officers of justice against the noted outlaw. The probabilities are that Whicher, the Chicago detective, was the man who was carrying a carpet case. Jesse James came out of their concealment alone and met Whicher in the road.

"Where in h—l are you going?" responded the other. "Well, it's a rude response, but I will not answer as rudely again. I am seeking work. Can you tell me where I can get some work on a farm?"

"I do not much, you don't want any either, you d—d thief. Old Pinkerton has already given you a job that will last you as long as you live. I reckon Jesse laughed a cold, hard laugh that meant death. Of
