Extra C.N.R. Trains For Holiday Rush

(Special to the Guardian)

MONTREAL, Dec. 15.—To meet the unprecedented demand for holiday travel facilities over Xmas, arrangements have been made by the Canadian National Railways to operate the Inter-city Limited between Ottawa and Toronto on Sunday, Dec. 26th. While this train does not ordinarily operate on Sundays, the space between the two cities for the day after Christmas has been so unusually heavy that it was found necessary to operate the Inter-city Limited on all trains in and out of Montreal over the Xmas holiday period as heavier than ever before stated.

The reason for the unusually heavy travel lies in the fact that Xmas day falls this year on Saturday making a long week end which is tempting people to travel.

Rev. Dr. Hartz Preaches 85th Birthday Sermon

AMHERST, Dec. 15.—Last evening was unique in the history of Trinity United Church when Dr. W. H. Hartz delivered a sermon on the occasion of his 85th anniversary of his birth.

His subject was the story of Abraham, "Who in obedience to the Divine call, went forth not knowing whither he was going." From this text he developed his theme "Twilight and the Adventure of Life."

In the course of his sermon he expressed thanks to Providence for the way in which he had been led during his lengthy ministry. He stated that for over seventy years he had been engaged in active Christian work, over sixty of which had been spent in the ministry, during which time he had preached in every province in Canada.

Dr. Hartz gave his impression of life in what he designated "The Twilight Age." Speaking particularly in reference to Missionary work, in which he was so deeply interested he made reference to the life beyond, concluding this sermon, which was delivered with his old time vigor and earnestness he quoted from Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar"

Dr. Hartz specially emphasized his present faith in the Gospel message with particular reference to the life beyond. In concluding this sermon, which was delivered with his old time vigor and earnestness he quoted from Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar"

Dr. Hartz was retiring from the active ministry, has continued preaching every Sunday, his calls being from Sydney, C. B., to Victoria, B. C., only a month ago he preached in New Glasgow, and next Sunday in Vancouver, B. C.

He was forty years a member of the former Methodist Mission Board which met at Toronto, and never missed a session. Last year he was elected Chairman of the Board of Missions of the United Church of Canada.

Dr. Hartz was pastor of Trinity Methodist Church, Amherst, forty-one years ago, and during his long ministry since has kept in touch with Amherst and its people. No man is better loved or more highly respected. He is a man of wonderful vigor for one of his age, and when at home is seen every day walking to the Post Office, long before many of the business men of the town are at their offices.

He has a kindly word for young and old, rich and poor, and his general smile and hearty handshake was like a benediction.

THE TEMPTRESS AT THE PRINCE EDWARD THEATRE

The only cattle to cut today were some canner cows at \$1.75 to \$2.00 and a few cutters at \$2.50 or better. Calves were in fair demand and the good quality lots were sold quickly at from \$9.25 to \$10.00 and grassers \$1.50 to \$5.00. The hog market was somewhat drabgy. Quotations were from \$11.25 to \$11.35 for select and \$10.75 to \$11.00 for ship hogs. Local butchers were paying \$11.50 on a flat basis.
