## English Capitalists Have Arranged For a Fast Ocean Service

St. John's, Nfld., Jan. 26.—English capitalists have closed a contract with the Government of Newfoundland for a fast transatlantic steamship line to run between a port on the Irish coast and St. John's. The steamers are to make twenty-two knots an hour.

The colony is to grant the company a subsidy of \$75,000 a year. An enactment confirming this contract will be introduced to the colonial legislature during the session which opens February 7.

Mrs. A. D. McPhee, of George's own, who has been confined to her bed for the past six weeks, following an operation for appendicitis, is reported to be slowly improving.

Lucy McDonald, 11 years of age, a daughter of the late Joseph R. McDonald, died on Sunday at Georgetown. She had been ill for some time from heart trouble.

She leaves to mourn her sad death, besides her husband, two sons Daniel and James, and Dr. S. A. Nicholson, Haverhill Mass, and three daughters Maggie at home and Jane and Catherine in Boston. Mr. LeLacheur, North Wiltshire, and McLean Bros., North Wiltshire, and McLean of E. E. Mutch & Co, are brothers of the deceased.

There passed away at her home in Murray Harbor South on Jan. 10th, Henrietta J. beloved wife of Charles T. Broadant in the 69th year of her age. She was the youngest daughter of the late Capt. David Bears who came to this land from Canada N.S. in 1852. Of the large family of which she was a member, three brothers and three sisters survive her. She was a woman of sterling character and strong faith and was for many years a member of the Methodist Church, being actively engaged in its work up to the time of her illness. The Women's Missionary Society especially will miss her wise counsel and earnest work. In the community she was a friend to all, and was always ready to lend a helping hand to those in need, and her death is mourned by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. Her illness lasted nearly a year and although at times her suffering was great she bore all with patience and resignation, and when the summons came, she was glad to go home. She leaves to mourn a husband, one son, Howard G. of Orange N.J., and four daughters, Mrs. James Brooks of Murray Harbor South, Mrs. Leith Cowan at the homestead, Miss Evalina F. of Pawtucket R.I. and Miss Alvah of Murray River. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. A. E. Chapman and was largely attended.
