AN ARMY OF PEACE

Well Equipped Buildings Needed For Technical Education

Dr. F. J. V. Merchant in discussing "Technical Education, said there was a great deal of talk about conservation these days, but the loss to the nation in the matter of material things was nothing compared to the unrealized gift of its citizens, which had no chance to find an outlet for its genius. The present system of evening classes was not one conducive to the best results. Pupils came jaded to the classes after their day's work, and the speaker contended that the day school must be depended upon more for the support of vocational education. The ages best suited for the making of industrial efficiency were between fourteen and sixteen, and it was here that the nation lost a large number of young members who might be drafted into the ranks of the technical schools. He was afraid that they would eventually have to take the action of Germany in this regard and make technical education compulsory. A great movement was going on with regard to militarism; halls were being erected all over the country, and Dr. Merchant declared that they wanted similar buildings equally well equipped for the training of what Lord Haldane calls "an army of peace to maintain industrial supremacy."

Ghost in a Negro Church A ghost which appears nightly in a window of a negro church in Alabama, has caused much fear. 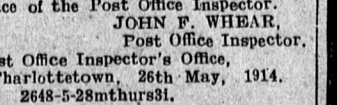
