REV. DR. S. C. GUNN is entering upon his thirteenth year as pastor of the Scotch Church, Boston. Mr. Gunn is well known in certain sections of this province.

W. F. BEST, formerly analyst in the city of St. John, has decided to locate in Victoria, B. C. He has opened an office as assayer and analytical chemist in the board of trade building.

THE Sun's Woodstock correspondent says: At a meeting of the Presbyterian congregation it was unanimously decided to extend a call to the Rev. Mr. Ireland, now in Alberton, Prince Edward Island.

The residents of St. Andrews, who know Miss Edwina Grey, (Mrs. Webber), regretted her absence, especially as it was caused by illness, from which they, as well as her Charlottetown friends, are pleased to hear she is recovering.

EDWARD J. CUSACK, of Cambridge, Mass., has reported to the police of that city, that he was knocked down in the Public Gardens by three men armed with revolvers and was robbed of \$45,000 and a nickel watch. He declares he received the money for a patent. The police place no reliance in the story, but are investigating it. The party above mentioned is probably Edward J. Cusack, of New Brunswick, reported recently as negotiating the sale of a water motor.

A WHOLESALE dealer has told the St. John Record that the tendency in the price of oats is decidedly upward and has been for several days. They are now being quoted at from 36 to 38c per bushel by the carload, where a few days ago 33c was the highest figure. Large shipments to England before the close of St. Lawrence navigation is causing a scarcity in the Dominion and the prospects are that oats will continue as high, if not higher in price. To the consumer Ontario oats cost 50c per bushel. Hay is cheap.

THE Independent Order of Oddfellows held their first social of the season yesterday evening in their beautiful hall, on Victoria Row. Mr. A. Down, a prominent member of the Order, presided and fittingly welcomed the guests. Mr. A. A. Bruce followed with the Oddfellows' Ode, sung with his usual success. CORRESPONDENCE from Boston, in a late number of the Halifax Mail, has the following: As of late there has been a large influx of young girls from Nova Scotia and P. E. Island the Mail correspondent had on interview with D. J. Lamont, proprietor of the Lamont Employment Bureau, at 47 Gray St., in reference to their chances of securing employment. He said that the number of girls coming from the Provinces every year, was increasing; but that wages were decreasing accordingly. What they call "green girls," can be had now for as low as a dollar, or a dollar and a half a week. This pay is advanced after a time, of course, but nevertheless the average Provincial girl is working for a great deal less than she was five years ago.

SUPREME COURT.

George Montague Phillips vs. Alex. Gillis.—A special case stated to the Court. The point in dispute in this case is as to whether the plaintiff, a grand nephew of the late Wm. Dodd, is entitled to share as heir to certain lands of the late Wm. Dodd. W. S. Stewart, Q. C., for plaintiff; F. L. Haszard, Q. C., for defendant. The case was finished Wednesday and judgment was reserved.

Re application of Mr. E. B. Williams. It appears that the applicant studied three years of the term of five years required with Mr. F. L. Haszard, Q. C., the remaining two years having been occupied as Private Secretary to the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. The Court refused the application of Mr. Williams for examination until the full term of 5 years study should be completed. Court adjourned until Tuesday, Dec. 6th.
