Houle, of the P. E. Island Railway Department. Referring to Dr. Houle the Regina Leader says: "Capt. Houle, M. O., is the medical officer in charge, a man who has had considerable experience in treating tuberculosis among the soldiers and thoroughly fitted to be at the head of such an institution."
