News Budget of Happenings Round About the District.

GUARDIAN readers are asked to remember that Mr. A. E. Morrison will read a paper in St. James' hall Tuesday evening, 15th inst., which will constitute the second lecture of the Y. M. L. A. course. The subject will be the laying of the Atlantic cable and will be illustrated with beautiful views, including a portrait of the originator, Cyrus W. Field. Mr. Morrison's ability to handle such a subject is well known in Charlottetown and a crowded house is predicted.

EVANGELIST MCKAY, of Stellarton, N. S., closed a series of union evangelistic services (seventeen,) in the Presbyterian church, at Montague, last night. The meetings were largely attended, the large church being crowded to its utmost capacity each night. Mr. McKay is an intensely interesting speaker as was evidenced by the crowds that came miles every night to hear him. The service of song was greatly enjoyed and the numerous testimonies given by the hearers is evidence that much good was accomplished. We wish him Godspeed and would advise any having an opportunity to hear him while he is on the Island not to miss it.

FORTY SEVEN YEARS AGO.—For those who may regard last night's snow storm as unusually early an old resident recalls the fact that on the 10th of November, 47 years ago, a big snow storm raged between Moncton and St. John and winter set in, in earnest, there being a hard frost and the snow drifting badly. On the 15th the ice was strong enough to carry people, but on the following day the weather turned soft and the mail coach was 26 hours in making the trip from St. John to Moncton. On that trip, which was a somewhat memorable one, the coach going almost axle deep in the snow, slush and mud, the passengers were Humphrey Gilbert, police magistrate of St. John, Robert Cutler, well known for many years in connection with the politics of Kent county, Captain Howard Beatty, John McKenzie and Archibald McKay, of Moncton. All these men are now dead, except Messrs. McKenzie and McKay. Mr. McKay went right through to P. E. Island, crossing in the Oregon, a schooner of about 30 tons, which had been frozen in the ice, but had been got out, and when he arrived on the Island he found it covered with nearly 2 feet of snow, through which he walked 12 miles to his destination. The people nowadays know very little of the hardships of winter, or the difficulties of it in the olden time.

P. E. I. PRODUCE.

(Maritime Merchant.)

Several cargoes have come to hand in the last week and the stock is turning out good, but sales are very slow, owing to the continued fine, warm weather, potatoes are selling at 35c; oats, 35 to 38c, and turnips 20 to 25c.

Reports from P. E. Island show that the potato crop is short, and prices are advancing. Shippers should however bear in mind the fact that this market is very limited and that quite a few New Brunswick potatoes find their way here, indeed at the present time New Brunswick shippers are anxious to sell at 30 cent delivered at Halifax, and the stock is of excellent quality, and coming more and more in favor with our consumers.

The condition of the world's market and not the extent of crop on the Island, must then to a considerable degree govern prices.

At one time the people of Halifax had to have Island calicoes at whatever cost, now they look to quality and price without regard to pedigree.

There is considerable firmness in the oat market yet prices do not advance.
