WEDNESDAY

The wedding takes place on Wednesday, Nov. 9th, of Captain Essie Tanner, of Lunenburg, to Capt. Charles B. Robinson, of this city. Rev. Geo. Ross and Brigadier Adby, St. John will perform the ceremony. Extensive preparations are being made and one hundred officers of the Army will be invited. The wedding will take place at eight o'clock in the Salvation Army Citadel here and the public will be admitted by ticket.

Augustine McInnis of Earncliffe, one of the most prominently known and well-to-do farmers of Queen's County, died about 9 o'clock Tuesday night under sad circumstances.

Since the death of his son who was accidentally killed in Colorado recently, Mr. McInnis has brooded much over the sad affair, so that his mind had become completely unbalanced.

Tuesday morning he visited his cousin, Rodger McInnis, of China Point, and it was while there that he took a dose of Paris green.

Two doctors were summoned, and worked hard to save his life, but their efforts proved unavailing. Mr. McInnis was a man of more than ordinary ability as a farmer; he was a well informed man on many subjects and a devoted member of the Roman Church. At times he was subject to dementia, but when not in this state was a man whom it was a pleasure to know.

He leaves several sons and daughters to mourn, who will have the sympathy of many friends in their sorrow.

The case of William Bryenton of Winsloe vs. H. H. Horne, was before His Honor Judge MacDonnell, at the County Court all day on Thursday. Judgement was reserved. In this case the plaintiff sues the defendant for \$54, alleging that the latter's dog had killed a number of his sheep.

It appears that the farmers of Winsloe had quite a number of sheep killed during the summer. Mr. Bryenton losing seven on August 3rd. About half a dozen witnesses on each side were examined. Two witnesses said that they saw dogs in the field on the day of the killing resting under a bush evidently gorged with their fill of mutton. About ten yards away lay a dead sheep and three wounded animals were also in the field. The witnesses declared that they were of the opinion that one of the dogs was a St. Bernard, belonging to Mr. Horne. Other evidence was produced to show that the dog was absent from home three days, including the day of the killing. Mr. Horne in his defence, produced evidence to show that the dog was at his place the three days referred to. "Red" as the big St. Bernard is called, weighs about 150 lbs. and was reported to be of good disposition and genial temperament. He is at present in Sydney.

William Bennett and Benjamin McQuade were ushers. For the present Mr and Mrs Graham will make their home with the bride's parents. The bride was born on Lincoln street, East Somerville, and has always lived in this city. She is a graduate of the Knapp school. For the past year he Graham has been a conductor on the Clarendon-hill line of cars. He is the son of William J. and Mrs Graham, of Sea View, P. E. I.
