FIGHTING FOR HIS LIBERTY

EASY CANTON, Mass., Feb. 1.—A legal fight for the liberty of James Mantir and Peter Delorey, young men from Nova Scotia, convicted of the murder of Annie Mullins, of St. John's, Nfld, takes place today before the full bench of the Supreme Judicial Court. This fight is based upon the numerous exceptions as to the admissibility of certain evidence taken at the trial in East Cambridge. The murder of Annie Mullins, which took place in Arlington three years ago, was one of the most baffling crimes that the detectives of this state ever had to contend with. The girl was found with her throat cut in Squire's Field. She had been employed as a maid in the home of a professor at Harvard College. She had left home in the evening for a walk. Early the next day her body was found on an embankment in the field with evidence that there had been a struggle. There was nothing about the girl to indicate who had killed her. The weapon, apparently a sharp knife or a razor, was never found. The motive for the crime could not be discovered. More than a year after the crime had been committed Mantir and Delorey were arrested. Their arrest came as a result of information given to the police by Mrs. Elizabeth K. Delorey, of Billerica, an aunt of Peter Delorey. She said that the next morning after the crime was committed the two boys, who had been employed on her farm, returned from a trip to Boston and told her about the discovery of the girl's body before it had been reported to the police and before it had been published in the newspapers. Delorey, after a third degree, confessed that he and his friend committed the crime. Friends here now come forward and say that Delorey's confession was a falsehood.

CONDITIONS AT SPRINGHILL MINES

shrunk very materially, owing to adverse conditions in the mine. The company at present is only raising from four to five hundred tons of coal a day, but the staff of employees is being steadily augmented. There are now from five hundred to six hundred lamps going, down into both mines every day in the three shifts. In addition to the miners and helpers there are a large number of men working on the surface so that the company has now in their employ fully eight hundred men.

Civic affairs in the town of Springhill are very quiet. There will probably be only one election contest and that in Ward Two, where Councillor Hopkins is again in the field against James Price. Tonight the Mayor and Councillors entertained the firemen at a dinner at the Scotia House. During the past year the firemen have served the town without any remuneration and this dinner is being given to them as a recognition of their services on behalf of the town. The bills, it is expected, will be charged up to the contingent account in the town clerk's books.

It is expected that appeals have been taken from the decision given by Judge Longley relative to the men on picket duty and that if an adverse decision is given by the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia, the case will be further carried to the Supreme Court of Canada.

Conditions in the town remain about the same. Picket duty has not been very active for the past few weeks and there is a growing feeling throughout the community that the company, who now control the mine, do not intend to hold any communication with the strikers, but are going to develop the property along their own lines.
