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Import of furs From U. S. to Be cut down

OTTAWA, Dec. 2.—(CP)—Import of fur skins from the United States is cut down drastically under new regulations brought down in the House of Commons by Finance Minister Inley.

Wholly or partially dressed fur skins from the U. S. are banned altogether. Undressed pelts and fur tails in the raw state may be imported from the U. S. only by licence.

A complete ban is applied on caps, hats, mufflers, coats and cloaks of fur and other manufactures of fur.

Last year, Canada imported \$876,465 worth of dressed fur products. Of this amount, \$355,811 came from the U. S.

Members of the Borden Women's Institute.

The time has once more arrived for our annual meeting and I, as President for the latter part of the year, do herewith submit to you the annual report of the bench which is as follows. Sent to the Prince County Hospital, one woolen blanket and one pair pillow cases, sent T. B. League \$14.25, gave Borden Bank \$5.00 as part of proceeds from Fox Show last year, purchased blinds, chamoms, etc. for Borden school, also gave \$10.00 for prizes at end of school year. Money total given to school, \$21.41. Wedding and farewell gifts \$12.52. Mass cards and sprays \$7.00. chairs for town hall \$10.00 sent to Institute branch for Ambulance Fund \$16.00, sent to Y.M.C.A. War Fund \$17.25, sent to each Orphanage \$5.00, to Canadian Legion War Fund \$2.00, to Red Cross War Fund \$1.00, paid for cleaning town hall 6.00, for coal \$12.80, dentist for poor child \$1.41, rent bill was \$39.99 and for the latter part of the year, the Institute has only visited and taken fruit or flowers to the members who are sick, instead of to all sick in the Community, as we previously did which has reduced the fruit bill considerable, paid town hall \$25.00 for running expenses and the total still remains in our funds \$15.01 of the improvement fund for the Town hall, as this year up to the present time there have not been improvements in the town hall. Our total receipts for this year with balance from last year is \$412.48 and our expenses were \$338.15 leaving a balance on hand of \$53.33.

During the year we gave a bag of flour to a needy family, arranged a Benefit Card Party for the Ambulance Fund realizing \$16.00, one for the Y.M.C.A. War Fund realizing \$17.25 and another for the T. B. League realizing the sum of \$8.25. A sum of money was collected by the Institute and two wrist watches were purchased and presented with an evening of entertainment to two of our young men who were the first to enlist for overseas service in the present war. This Institute sent two delegates to the T. B. League Convention, and took part in the District Convention held at Searletown, and had the honour of having the most members answering roll call at district convention also the best financial report. The members of this Institute who attended the Convention drove to Westview Lodge for supper, returning to take part in the evening program. Our picnic this year was held in September with the members driving to Westview Lodge for supper.

I think our Institute had a good year considering the demands made on people for money for war work so that the only means at our disposal to raise funds was by holding our series of card parties. In the year we realized the sum of \$247.19 from these our expenses in connection with same being \$111.72. The Red Cross Committee of our Institute with Mrs. Julian Herring as chairman, has completed a wonderful lot of work in the past year, a report of which will be given you by Mrs. Herring. In concluding my report I wish to thank all the members for their kind cooperation which helped to make this war year the success it was.
