### NAZI VICTORY STIRS HOPES FOR PEACE

#### NATIONS VIEW SAAR VOTE OPTIMISTICALLY

League Council Prepares To Hand Territory Over to Germany.

Germany's smashing victory in the Saar plebiscite Sunday stirred new hopes for peace in Europe. In the Saar, meanwhile, Nazis celebrated their overwhelming victory. They polled 90 per cent of the total vote cast. Saarbrücken — a jubilant Nazi celebration caused hundreds of Socialists to take refuge in the Socialist centre, imploring the League of Nations' protection, while most leaders of the status quo faction went into hiding. Nazis took over police control, jailing 30 anti-Nazis.

#### Dental Health Campaign Launched Last Evening

Enthusiastic Indorsation Of Movement Expressed At Function Organized By Provincial Health Department — Stirring Appeal By Dr. H. S. Thomson.

Unanimous indorsation of a Province-wide dental health campaign was voiced at a largely attended function in the Canadian National Hotel last evening, held under the auspices of the Provincial Health Department, at which Dr. H. S. Thomson, of Toronto, Field Secretary of the Canadian Dental Hygiene Council, was the chief speaker.

The address, which was preceded by a dinner function, marked the inauguration of a campaign in which the active assistance of every philanthropic health and service organization in the Province is being solicited. It is hoped by this means to rouse public opinion and carry a dental clinic into sections of the Province where dental services are not available, the clinic to be for poor children only, under 12 years of age, and to be carried on directly by the Provincial Health Department and the Prince Edward Island Dental Association.

Each dentist in the Province will be asked to give at least two days of his time to make a mouth examination of all the pupils in every school, and to check up on the dental status of his mouth to take home in order that added emphasis may be given to the campaign's health efforts, and furnish to pupil and parent a concrete example of the danger of neglect, and the benefit from treatment.

Hon. W. J. MacMillan, M. D., Minister of Health and Education, presided. There were present His Honour Lieutenant Governor DeBlois, His Worship Mayor Kennedy, representatives of the Government, the Legislature and City Council, the clergy, the Education Department, the Prince Edward College and St. Dunstan's University, the Charlottetown School Board, the Teachers' Federation, the Women's Institutes, the Dental Association, the Medical Association, the Red Cross Society, the P. E. I. Charlottetown and White Wood Hospitals, the Free Dispensary, the I. O. O. E., the Catholic Women's League, the Y. M. C. A., the Rotary, Gyro, Y's Men's and Holy Name Clubs, the P. E. I. Nurses' Association, the Canadian Legion, the Life Insurance Unwriters, the Children's Aid Society, the press and radio stations.

The Premier, in a few introductory remarks, thanked all present for their attendance. He reviewed as reported elsewhere, activities of the Provincial Department of Health since its inauguration in July, 1931, and stated that the dental hygiene campaign now proposed was one of great and far-reaching importance. The Government he explained could not afford to shoulder the whole financial responsibility but it was co-operating in every possible way to make this campaign a success.

Brief remarks were also made by Dr. Keopling, Chief Health Officer with regard to the work of the Department. It has been found, he said, that roughly 80 per cent of defects in school children are dental defects, and it is felt that this is one field in which the activities of the Department might be extended.

#### Cape Breton Suffers Severe Storm Damage

SYDNEY, N. S., Jan. 15—All colleges in the Glace Bay, New Waterford and Sydney Mines areas were tied up tonight by huge snowdrifts in the wake of a blizzard that caused widespread havoc as it swept across Cape Breton.

Transportation and communication systems were disrupted throughout the northern section of the island, although the Canadian National Railways kept close to schedules.

With high seas running along the coast, the Sydney and Louisburg railroad services from Glace Bay to Louisburg was halted because of the danger of washouts along the line.

Telegraph and telephone services felt the full force of the blizzard and as one time 50 lines were reported out of commission on the island.

Royal Canadian Mounted Police were still investigating a report that two boys had seen an unidentified man disappear near the edge of a 60-foot cliff at Glace Bay, but the rocky shore below remained unconfirmed tonight.

Whistling over other sections of Nova Scotia last night and early today, the blizzard whipped a 15-inch snowfall into high drifts, blocking roads and interfering with communication services in various parts of the province.

#### Fox Breeders Meet In Saskatoon

SASKATOON, Jan. 15—Fox fur farming in 1934 was reviewed by 40 delegates representing every province in Canada at the 15th annual meeting of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders' Association here today. It was the first annual meeting in the history of the industry to be held in a city west of Toronto.

Technical changes in the constitution came up for discussion, with George Callbeck, of Summerside, P. E. I., President, in the chair. The last annual meeting was held in Quebec City.

#### Liquor Fraud Case Adjudged Until Middle Of Next Month

MONTREAL, Jan. 15—While Judge Jules Desnoes prepares a judgment as to the validity of one of the counts in the indictment, preliminary hearing of 51 of 62 persons accused by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police of conspiracy to defraud the Dominion and Quebec governments out of more than \$5,000,000 through liquor smuggling, has been adjourned until Feb. 4. Judge Desnoes said today if he reaches a decision on the point at issue before that time he will notify counsel and the case will be continued sooner.

Special prosecutors Jean Penverne, K.C., and James Cranshaw shattered lanes against an imposing array of legal talent for the defence in a long legal joust today. "The issue was whether or not it could be considered a crime to ship liquor from Canada into the United States during the prohibition era."

#### Disrupted Hearing

Consideration of charges against Sam, Allan, Harry and Abe Bronfman, Montreal distillers, David Costley, Barney Aaron and F. S. Blair, of Montreal, and Mrs. E. Carline of Montreal and Halifax, was to occupy the court today, but the legal argument sprang up and temporarily disrupted the hearing.

#### Crown Contention

Crown counsel argued that where accused and their agents allegedly collected payments from United States bootleg trade and shipped the liquor to St. Pierre Miquelon or some other destination with the intention of later re-routing the liquor to the United States they were violating the laws of another country.

#### Native County Offers Rhodes Nomination

AMHERST, N. S., Jan. 15—Conservatives of Cumberland County have offered Hon. E. N. Rhodes a nomination in this constituency for the forthcoming Federal election, it was learned today.

The Minister of Finance now represents Richmond-West, Cape Breton in the House of Commons, having been accorded an acclamation after resigning the premiership of Nova Scotia on Aug. 11, 1930, to become Minister of Fisheries in the Bennett Cabinet.

The Cape Breton riding has been held for the Conservatives in the 1930 general election by Dr. John Alexander Macdonald who resigned to make way for Mr. Rhodes. Dr. Macdonald was called to the Senate in 1932.

Decision to ask the Finance Minister to stand in his native county was reached at a recent caucus of Conservatives from various sections of Cumberland.

#### RETIRE AS SPEAKER OF HOUSE

OTTAWA, Jan. 15—Just as preparations were being completed for the opening of the parliamentary session on Thursday, political circles were surprised today by the resignation of Hon. George Black as Speaker of the House of Commons. An illness which struck him in the last few weeks and is partly due to his war experiences is the reason for Speaker Black's resignation.

His retirement will necessitate the selection of a new presiding officer for the House of Commons on Thursday. Armand Lavergne the deputy speaker is also reported in poor health and it is unlikely he will be able to attend the session, at least for several weeks.

#### N. B. GOVERNMENT PROPOSES DAIRY PRODUCTS ACT

Agricultural Minister Believes Legislation Would Bring About Improved Conditions In Industry.

FREDERICTON, N. B., Jan. 15—A dairy products act will be introduced at the forthcoming session of the New Brunswick legislative assembly "to eliminate unethical practices among dealers in milk and cream, to obtain for the producer a fair return on his labor and capital invested, and to give the consumer a first class quality product at a stable price."

This announcement was made here tonight by Hon. Lewis Smith, Minister of Agriculture, while speaking at a banquet held in conjunction with the 59th annual convention of the New Brunswick Farmers' and Dairymen's Association.

#### Judgement In MacMillan Case Appealed

EDMONTON, Jan. 15—A general attack on the verdict of a jury which awarded Vivian MacMillan and her father, W. D. MacMillan, of Edson, Alta., \$15,000 in the civil court action here in June was indicated today by A. I. Smith, K.C., Montreal, former Premier of Alberta.

Judgment of Mr. Justice W. C. Ives refusing to allow the verdict, is being appealed in the appellate division of the Alberta Supreme Court. The jury found there had been seduction, and awarded damages. Mr. Justice Ives ruled the gist of the action was damages, and disallowed the award because there had been no loss of services.

Today, before Chief Justice Horace Harvey and his colleagues of the Supreme Court, Mr. Smith indicated that for the respondent would challenge the jury's finding of seduction. It was also revealed he would file a cross-appeal against the verdict of the jury.

#### Addresses Huge Montreal Meeting

Appeals On Behalf Of Younger Generation For Economic Reform And Eradication Of Existing Abuses.

MONTREAL, Jan. 15.—Declaring that he had no desire to wreck the capitalist system but wished only to make it "decent and clean," Prime Minister R. B. Bennett laid his reform programme before an audience that crowded Atwater Market Hall here tonight. "Do you want minimum wages, maximum hours of work?" he asked his listeners. "If you don't then vote for Taschereau and King."

Mr. Bennett was referring to his proposed minimum wage law and law fixing the maximum working week, social reforms which he declared the Liberal administration had never attempted to achieve.

SYSTEM CAN BE CHANGED

He was neither a Communist, Fascist, nor a Socialist, Mr. Bennett said. "But I say the system can be so changed as to make these things (depression conditions) impossible."

Mr. Bennett mentioned five conditions illustrative of the failure of the economic system to serve present day needs, and of his declaration that things could never be the same again.

#### SENATOR LOGAN DENIES CHARGES

OTTAWA, Jan. 15—Emphatic denials by Senator H. J. Logan of any knowledge the "Gypsum Queen" reparation claim might be spurious featured the opening defence of the Government's \$71,000 suit against the Senator and Captain Freeman Hatfield before the Eschquer Court of Canada today. Equally emphatic was the Senator's denial of conspiring in any way with Hatfield in submissions before the Canadian Reparation Commission which had resulted in the claim being paid.

"I entered into no conspiracy," warmly declared the Senator. "I never discussed with Captain Hatfield any false evidence and do not know that any false evidence was given."

"Were you party to any arrangement that should be filed with the commission?" asked W. N. Tilley, counsel for Logan.
