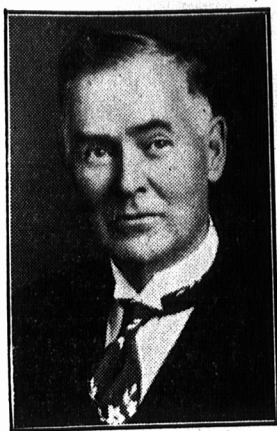

—GIVEN SUSPENDED SENTENCE—Two young lads were brought before Magistrate Darby yesterday by the Summerside detachment of the R. C. M. P. charged with destroying property at Silver shore and stealing small articles from the cottages. The boys were each given suspended sentence of six months with sureties for their good behaviour. There has been a good deal of this willful damage to summer cottages and the police intend to round up the culprits and in future any found guilty will not be so lightly dealt with by the Magistrate.—S.

—GIVEN TUBERCULIN SKIN TEST—772 school children from five school districts were given the tuberculin skin test during the past several weeks. Sixty pupils of Millington Lot 8 were tested by Dr. B. C. Tanton, assisted by Miss Leslie, Public Health Nurse at Alberton. The percentage of infection found ranged from five per cent to forty per cent. The average for the five schools tested was only 21 per cent of positive reactors. 161 cases from these schools will next have to be X-rayed to determine to what extent these pupils are suffering from tuberculosis. Schools desiring to have tuberculin test are asked to communicate with the public health nurse.—S.

Scotland Yard Seeks To Solve Mystery

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) WIMBLEDON, England, July 14.—Scotland Yard tonight sited stories of midnight whispers in a darkened lane and of a terrified man in a Tribby hat in an effort to solve the mystery of the slaying of a young woman hardly 100 yards from Wimbledon's famed centre tennis court.

Two puzzling leads came from workers in the green-headed residential district fringing the all-England Tennis Club where the brunette woman in black was found cubbed and slashed to death. 1. A watchman's tale of a running man in a brow hat whose eyes seemed to be popping out of his head. 2. The story of a cook in a nearby residence who saw two cars pull up side by side in the lane where the body was found and heard one driver whisper, "are you all right?" Both incidents occurred about midnight last night, an hour after the established time of death.

Kidnapper Pays Death Penalty

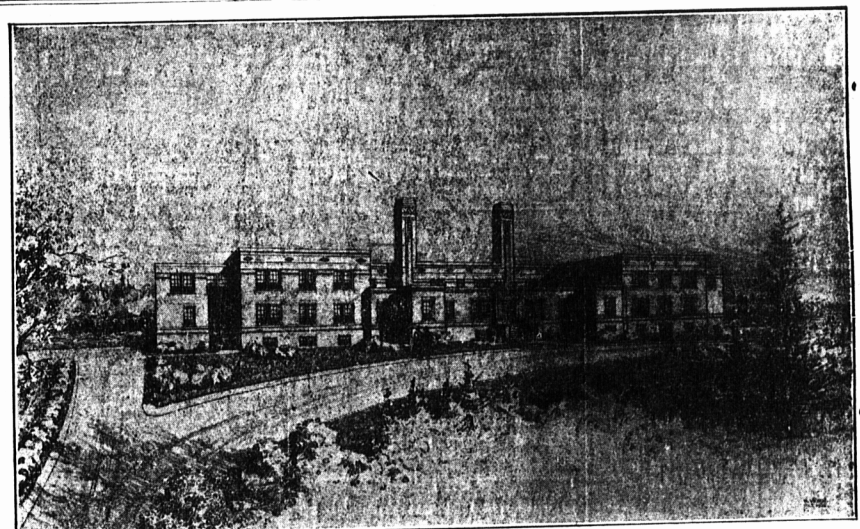
(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, July 14—John Henry Seadlund paid with his life today for the crime of kidnapping. The 27-year-old lumberjack, confessed abductor of Charles S. Rosen, confessed killer of the man who helped him commit the crime, was electrocuted at 3:08 a.m. A.D.T. in the Cook County jail.

Shaved and masked, Seadlund walked tensely into the execution chamber almost unaided. "You don't have to hold my arms," he told the guards on each side of him. "I can get there alone." After seating himself he made a visible effort to relax and held his arms out for the clamps.

He was the second man to be executed by the federal government under the Lindbergh kidnap law. The first was Arthur Goetz, 27, hanged at McAlester, Okla., June 19, 1936, for kidnapping two peace officers at Paris, Texas, while attempting to avoid arrest.

Seadlund and James Atwood Gray, his 19-year-old accomplice kidnapped Ross in Northern Illinois last Sept. 25. They took the 72-year-old retired manufacturer of greeting cards to a hideout in Wisconsin's north woods near Spooner.

There, Seadlund confessed to agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, he killed Gray during a quarrel. Ross was fatally injured in the struggle, Seadlund said, so he shot him, too.
