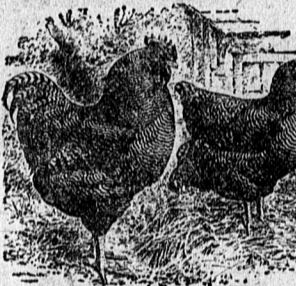

FOOTBALL

A FIASCO.

Lovers of football in the city were sorely disappointed on Thursday afternoon, when the game that was scheduled to take place between the football team of the Mic Macs and the St. Dunstan's College team was abandoned. The generally accepted suggestion that the weather was responsible for the fixture falling through is not the real reason. There were other circumstances responsible, and unfortunately so. It seems that history repeated itself in this matter. Two years ago, the Mic Macs came down to Charlottetown to play any team that would take them up, and the Collegians on that occasion also took up the gauntlet, but through some misunderstanding and other unfortunate circumstances the game did not materialize, and regrettably, but the Indians have persisted in their football, being encouraged therein by the Rev. Father John McDonald, recognizing the value of the game in its character-moulding tendencies. When the arrangements were made for the Indians to come down and play St. Dunstan's on Thursday afternoon it was anticipated that there would be an interesting game. But again through some misunderstanding the arrangement ended in a fiasco. It appears that the game was arranged on the part of St. Dunstan's, by their coach, Mr. Cameron, without consultation of the officers of the St. Dunstan's Association, and on this account, the College team were not allowed to take the field against the Mic Macs on Thursday afternoon, even though the Indians were actually on the scene and had gone to some trouble and expense to come down to the city. That this attitude should have been taken by the St. Dunstan's Association is regrettable and spells too much of dignity and too little of sport.

PROMOTION FOR GERMAN CONSUL AT MONTREAL.

Owing to the increased commercial interests between Germany and Canada, the Imperial German consulate in Canada is to be raised in importance and the post will hereafter be in charge of a consul-general. The present incumbent of the office, Dr. Karl Lang, will be promoted to the new position.

FATHER OF LABOR DAY DEAD.

MANCHESTER, N. H., Nov. 24.—Geo. McGuire, known in labor circles as "the Father of Labor Day", died here last night. McGuire, who was a cigar maker, first made the suggestion of a labor holiday at a labor convention in Chicago in 1884. He renewed the suggestion at later conventions and from his efforts resulted the wide observance of Labor Day.

FIVE EAST INDIANS WERE KILLED IN SOUTH AFRICAN AFFRAY.

DURBAN, Natal, Nov. 28.—Five East Indians were killed yesterday in another serious affray between the strikers and the police which occurred on the Backburn sugar estate in the Mount Edgecombe district, about fourteen miles to the north of Durban. The most important sugar crushing mill in Natal is located there. The police were obliged to fire several volleys before they succeeded in quelling the rioters.

ISLANDER DIES IN ST. JOHN.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 28.—Mrs. Wm. Brundage, formerly Ester Adams of Prince Co., P. E. Island, died today aged 47. She moved here three years ago. She leaves a husband, two sons here, and one J. R., in Prince Edward Island, also two brothers and two sisters on the Island.

GERMANS BOUGHT BEST HORSES AT OLD GLORY SALE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—German horsemen captured the best offerings yesterday at the Old Glory sale at Madison Square Gardens. Max Wolf paid \$200 for Baron Gate, which earned the championship for four-year-olds in 1901. This was the highest price paid for a trotter during the day. The chestnut mare, Rose Gale, a daughter of Bettinger, out of Princess, also went to Germany, Charles Mills paying \$1,220 for her. American bidders came to the front and took Solola. This mare was bid in by Molman Vaud. Bon Voyage, winner of the Kentucky Futurity in 1904, and sold at the Old Glory sale last year, was again in the ring and was bid in by James Hazelton, of Indianapolis, for \$2,250.

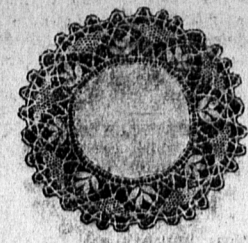
