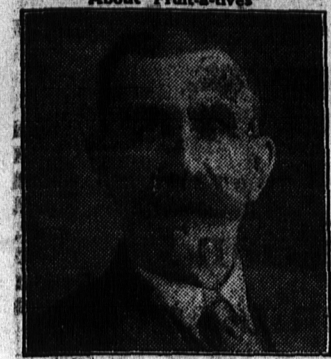


WILL WE EVER WALK ON AIR?
