THE FIRST BOOT FACTORY—With reference to the notice of the death of Mr. Richard Goff, it has been drawn to our attention that Mr. Lewis Goff joined Mr. Dorsey in partnership in the Charlottetown Boot and Shoe Factory, the firm being known as Dorsey, Goff & Co. Mr. Dorsey was the first to establish a boot and shoe factory in the city, and at one time employed nearly a hundred men. As Mr. Dorsey was fully employed in the manufacturing side of the business he consented to a partnership with Mr. Goff for the financial end. When Mr. Dorsey died in 1884, the business was continued by Messrs Lewis and Richard Goff under the name of Goff Bros, of which Mrs. Dorsey remained a partner for some years.

ANOTHER ISLANDER HONORED—It is pleasing to note that another Islander has won fame on the battle field in Flanders, for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Sergeant Major Ernest Ellmore Stevenson has been honored with the D.C.M., which conferred on N.C.O.'s Sergeant-Major Stevenson, who is a native of New Glasgow, and spent his boyhood days at Wheatley River, first entered the military service as private in Covelock Company, 32nd Battalion, then in command of Capt. Albert Shaw. The second year at camp saw him a company sergeant. Having a true martial spirit it he stened on for garrison duty as an artilleryman and was sent to Esqui malt, later transferred to Quebec Citadel and afterwards to Halifax. At the time the 105th was being raised in P. E. Island, he offered his services to his native province, but could not obtain release from the permanent force. Later he was employed at different camps as instructor till finally No. 8 Siege Battery, to which he was attached for overseas service. He has been in the thick of the fight since May of last year. It may be remarked that Sergeant-Major Stevenson has four brothers serving the King, two being with him in France.
