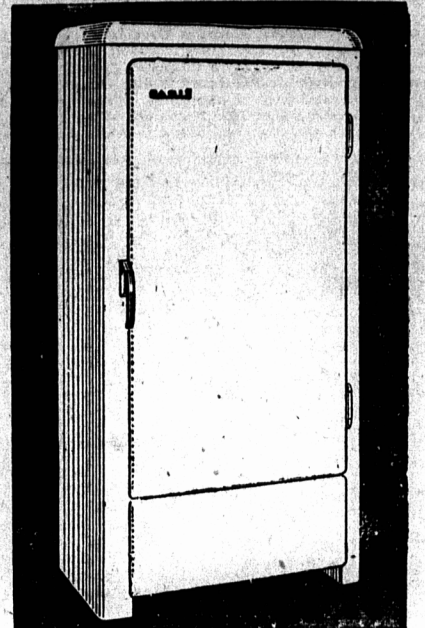
Heads Newfoundland C. N. R. Telegraphs

TORONTO, Ont., April 1.—The appointment of Harold J. Clarke, formerly assistant secretary, Newfoundland Department, Posts and Telegraphs, to be Superintendent of the Newfoundland District, Canadian National Telegraphs, was announced today by W.M. Armstrong, general manager. Mr. Clarke will have jurisdiction over all Canadian National Telegraphs operations in Newfoundland with headquarters at St. John's. Born in 1910 at Victoria, Nfld., Mr. Clarke received his early education on the Island, graduating from both the Methodist College and the Memorial University College at St. John's. In 1932 he graduated from Dalhousie University, Halifax, in engineering. Two years later he became identified with the Newfoundland posts and telegraphs as inspector, telegraph division, and five years later was made departmental inspector.

Tells U. N. Of Maritime Co-Ops

By Norman Altedder Canadian Press Staff Writer LAKE SUCESS, N. Y., April 1.—(CP)—An eminent Canadian educationist and social leader yesterday urged the United Nations to use the co-operative movement in the Maritime Provinces as a model for boosting the backward areas of the world. Magr. M. M. Coady, director of the Extension Department of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, N.S., told a press conference the co-operative idea, provided a middle road between Communism and extreme capitalism. "It is a method of getting people ready to accept outside aid without losing their souls," Father Coady said. Earlier he outlined to the United Nations sub-commission on economic development the 20-year history of the "Antigonish movement," which started on a shoestring and now runs huge producer-and-consumer co-operatives with 100,000 members. Father Coady, a leader from the beginning of the movement's work in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, was chosen by the International Co-operative Alliance as its spokesman before the sub-commission. An alliance spokesman described the burly, white-haired, Roman Catholic priest as the best technical expert available to outline the relation between the co-operative movement and President Truman's "bold new program" of aid to under-developed areas. Father Coady is general-secretary of the Co-operative Union of Canada. The sub-commission has been studying methods of carrying out the program of technical assistance planned by the last session of the economic and social council. "I can't conceive of any place being so poor where the Antigonish plan won't work," Father Coady said.

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
