**Your Not So Tough With Dead End Kids At Capitol**

Universal is taking the Dead End Kids and Little Tough Guys off the city pavements, away from the gang-crime-police-problem environment and is experimenting with them in the realm of acting. The picture is "You're Not So Tough," seen yesterday at the Capitol Theatre. **WHEAT RECEIPTS DOWN**

**OTTAWA, Sept. 18 (CP)—** Wheat receipts in the Prairie Provinces amounted to 10,264,339 bushels in the week ended Sept. 13, compared with 42,806,029 the same week last year the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

Receipts by provinces, with comparisons for 1939 in brackets, were: Manitoba 2,958,215 bushels (5,223,075); Saskatchewan 11,708,782 (29,428,707); Alberta 1,597,342 (8,157,845).

**Offers To Care For Dependents**
