(Sweet or White)
For general purposes use
Nitrogen in the form of Nitrate of Soda 180 to 360 lbs.
Available Phosphoric Acid in the form of Acid Phosphate 325 to 650 lbs.
Potash in the form of muriate or sulphate 130 to 260 lbs.
Suggestions. The use of stable-manure appears to favor the growth of potato-scab. When used stable-manure should be applied to a preceding crop. Wood-ashes are also reported to favor the attack of scab. It is commonly held that sulphate of potash produces potatoes of better quality than does muriate. The testimony on this point is conflicting.
