Misappropriated Army Funds

MOSCOW, Jan. 2.—An effigy of Almighty God surrounded by devils andimps of all kinds will be hauled through the streets of Moscow on Jan. 7 and will later be burned at a public ceremony by students of the University of Moscow, who are the sponsors. The Georgian Christmas falls on Jan. 7.

Cotterell, superintendent of transportation, Canadian Pacific Railway, announced today. Heavy rail shipments are now expected to commence from Port Arthur and Fort William to New York, Boston and Baltimore.

RAPS GROWTH OF MATERIALISM

LONDON, Jan. 1.—The most striking passage in the Archbishop of Canterbury's New Year's message is his reference to "sheer materialism, blunt, patent, unabashed, which seems to wax rapt than wane in England's home circles."

The message says that selfishness and greed of gain go hand in hand with the weakening of the bond with home ties and those simple domestic obligations which were formerly considered distinctively English.

CANCER ON INCREASE

LONDON, Jan. 1.—The alarming spread of cancer is given prominence in the publication of a report on the disease by the medical officer for Kent. He states that 1921 had the highest death rate yet recorded. It was nearly 50 per cent above 1908. One in every 780 deaths in 1921 was due to cancer, a greater proportion than was credited to any other disease with the exception of heart disease.

Premier Law Proposes New Reparations Scheme

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, Jan. 2.—Premier Bonar Law proposed to the Premier's Conference a four year moratorium for Germany and a reduction of the reparation payments to fifty million gold marks. He also proposed a system of cancellation of Allied debts.

France under this scheme will receive the first series of German bonds. The second series will be pooled and distributed among nations indebted to the United States in ratio of their debts.

MONTREAL, Jan. 1.—St. Patrick's world's champions, lost to Canadiens on Saturday night, 8 to 2, in the N. H. L. series.

DETROIT, Jan. 2.—Clasping the hand of Detective John O'Keefe, one of the officers who had shot him, Joseph Ryan, "boy bandit", died with a jest on his lips last week.

Schooner Was Sunk By Steamer

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—A two-masted schooner sunk off Barnegat, N. J., in collision with the tanker Nora, Saturday, with the loss of two of her crew, was identified tonight by A. B. Beebe, of the United New Jersey and Sandy Hook Pilots' Benevolent Association as the Jeannette of Halifax. Five of the Jeannette's crew were saved.

Sarah Bernhardt Takes Another Turn

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Paris reports say that Sarah Bernhardt's condition is less satisfactory. One report says that the actress is dying.

Plans To Crush Arson Ring

CHICAGO, Jan. 2.—Declaring "irregular" fires had cost Chicago more than \$1,000,000 annually, John F. Cullerton, fire commissioner, today announced plans to crush an arson ring to which he attributed their increase of 50 fires each month for the past half year.

Photographers Will Map French Sky

PARIS, Jan. 2.—An ambitious scheme to map the sky of France will be carried out this week beginning January 15 by amateur photographers in all parts of the country under the direction of the national weather bureau. LONDON, Jan. 2.—Report from Italy says Italian cruiser San Giorgio aided by airplane has bombed rebel fortification at Misurata on Librian coast of North Africa.

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—Cuban agents begin search for German ship Heinrich Kayser, which sailed from Germany for Norfolk, Va., with Chancellor of Cuban Consular Corps aboard and which was last heard from December 6th when she was reported disabled and in distress in heavy seas off Canadian coast.

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 2.—Harry Greb, a Gricon light heavyweight champion won newspaper decision over Bob Roper on New Year's day in a 10 round bout. Greb weighed 164 pounds and Roper 158.

The Law Will Take Its Course

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Mrs. Edith Thompson and Fredk. Bywaters, will be hanged simultaneously at nine a. m. Tuesday, January 9th for the murder of the woman's husband. The Daily Mail announced yesterday. The Home Secretary has decided to refuse their petitions for clemency, the Mail declares it learns from official sources. Mrs Thompson is expected to become a mother early in the new year.

British Unions Issue Manifesto

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, Jan. 2.—The Trades Union Congress today issues a manifesto attacking the government for alleged lack of real effort to end unemployment.

"Workers' homes are stripped of elementary necessities, to buy food, the manifesto states. Many local authorities are bankrupt through their efforts to feed men and trades union funds are depleted."
