SHEEP DIPPING.— On Tuesday a sheep dipping demonstration was conducted by the Department of Agriculture at the farm of Mr. Alexander McDonald, Orwell Cove. Over 100 sheep were dipped and about 150 remain to be dipped. The rain in the afternoon prevented further operation, but the tank will remain where it is until the weather permits the completing of the dipping. The demonstration will then be conducted at Newton Cross, Eldon and Mt. Buchanan.

THE PEOPLE'S.— An altogether interesting set of pictures were shown at the People's Theatre last night to a large house. The last number of the "Mary" series showed the popular heroine suitably married after various grotesque and embarrassing proposals from bearded counts and other equally impossible persons—to Captain Bradford, a strong and good-looking man. INSPECTION OF ARTILLERY.— The annual inspection of the Artillery Militia Regiment of this province took place yesterday afternoon and last evening. The inspecting officer was Major Hewitt of the Royal Canadian Artillery, Halifax. The Regimental Band, in full strength for the inspection and presented a very creditable appearance. Assembling at the Drill Hall, and under the command of Colonel Peake, the Regiment, with the regimental band, marched to Victoria Park, where it was exercised in infantry company drill and also inspected in rifle exercises, in all of which it gave a highly satisfactory account of itself. At the inspecting officer remarked that the Regiment was among the best he had ever seen. In the evening, No. 4. Battery was engaged in section gun drill with the horses and guns, on the park roadway, and subsequently both batteries turned out for the master parade in the drill hall. Tonight, No. 3. Battery will inspect in section gun drill, and officers and non-coms. will answer questions.

MURRAY HARBOR.— Rev. A. J. MacNeill, Presbyterian Minister, Murray Harbor, being away in Ontario, his pulpit was filled by Rev. Mr. Sutherland, Murray Harbor North. Mr. Sutherland took for his text the third verse of the twenty-third Psalm, which is "The leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake." He dwelt for some time on this passage, especially as he said it soothed the spirit just by repeating it to one's self. He, likewise, explained the difference between the two words "leadeth" used in this chapter. In the first place "leadeth" means that we have already enjoyed some great privilege and are being led along in this path. The second word "leadeth" means that we expect something that is really inside of us all the time. It simply means guideth.— Up till time of writing the body of Roland White, drowned a few miles from his home, Murray Harbor North, was not found. The community expresses its heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved parents.— Rev. L. H. Jewett preached a very interesting sermon on Sunday last in the Methodist Church Murray Harbor.— The roads around Murray Harbor are in fairly good condition. This speaks well of the energetic road-master, Mr. H. Brehaut.— God-fishing is turning out fairly well this season. The fishermen of this vicinity are very busy running lines.

THE PRINCE EDWARD.— Excellence of selection and excellence of presentation were the outstanding features of the program of entertainment presented in large houses at the Prince Edward Theatre last night. The new picture machine was set in motion last night by the new operator, Mr. W. Roy Mitchell, St. John. It is the very latest model of Power's cinematograph and is a decided improvement over the old machines. Besides many other new features it has six levers which will make fourteen adjustments of the light on the picture, whereas the old machines have only two adjustments. Another improvement is an automatic loop-setter which will do away with the trouble caused by patched films. With the machine is a current-saver, which regulates the current, and instead of always being at full force the current can be reduced to just the amount needed. One of the principal features of the machine is that it is of iron and absolutely fire-proof. By the operation of two machines the performance is maintained without the slightest wobble between the reels. As soon as one reel was finished on one machine, another reel was started on the second one. The two features of the pictorial program last night were "A Buried Secret," a big three-part detective drama with a love story interwoven, and "In the Coils of a Python," a strong drama of the jungle. The comedy drama "Mike and Jake in the Clutch of Circumstances" provided the audience with a great laugh.
