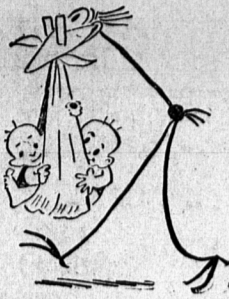

ranching and mentioning the prices obtained for breeding pairs and also for skins, the article concludes: "The fox-breeding industry is at present in a very speculative condition; but there seems little doubt that it should prove very remunerative if carried out on a fair scale under intelligent management."

Mrs. W. A. Brennan and Miss Dorothy Brennan, of P. E. Island, have registered at the offices of the High Commissioner in London.

Although the Australians were the victors in the shoot for the Rajah of Kolapore's Challenge Cup at Bisley this week, the struggle was extremely close from start to finish, for at no stage of the contest were the leading teams—the Mother Country, Australia and Canada—separated by so much as seven points, and the Australians only clinched their victory by the last shot fired in the match. The contest attracted a large gathering of spectators, who followed the shooting with keen interest. The blackboard on which

the Canadian scores were recorded was decked with maple branches, and as coat-of-arms there was a chalk sketch of two beavers guarding a maple leaf. Australia's emblem was the kangaroo and an emu; and India had a small tiger. At the start the Mother Country was doing well, but the second half of the team failed to keep it up. In the range aggregates the Mother Country and Australia were equal at 258, with Canada at 255, and India and Guernsey following. Australia secured the lead in the 500 yards. In the 600 yards Canada made a big effort and gained on the Mother Country by four points. Canada had finished 774 and Australia was 771, with a shot to go. Parsons had to get an inner to win for the Commonwealth and he took a bull's-eye, Australia thus taking the trophy by two points.

The "At Home" given by Lt.-Col. J. G. and Mrs. Ross at the Canadian Pavilion in the Camp on Thursday of this week was marked by a fine spirit of friendship between Canadians and Australians. It was a happy thought on the part of Col. Ross, to ask Col. Merrett, Commandant of the Australian team, to present a gold watch on behalf of the Canada Club in London, to Sergt. Armstrong, who was second in lavelling the highest aggregate in the Canadian team. Sergt. Stoddart had previously received a silver cup from the hands of Hon. Geo. H. Perley, who, though he is not even Acting High Commissioner, was good enough to follow up Lord Strathcona's custom of awarding such a trophy.

Both Canadian and Australian Commandants, as well as Hon. Mr. Perley, urged the desirability of maintaining the Bisley meet as an Empire affair, and Col. Merrett went so far as to promise that if Canada had to drop out owing to insistence in regard to the proposed new regulations, then Australia would take steps to visit the Dominion in order to meet their brother riflemen.

Bishop Stringer of the Yukon, who with Mrs. Stringer has spent the past half-year in the Old Country, sails to-day (24 July) in the Empress of Britain for Canada. The visit has been anything but a holiday, for Dr. Stringer has fulfilled numerous preaching and lecturing engagements throughout the British Isles, his main object being to inform, and evoke the interest of the old land in regard to his extensive and solitary diocese. Seen on the eve of his departure, Bishop Stringer expressed appreciation of the hospitality extended to himself and wife personally and also of the ready sympathy accorded to the claims made for his work. The £10,000 episcopal endowment fund is now only about £1,300 short, and the Bishop has also encountered clergy who are willing to take up the work in the diocese when funds permit. It is a far cry from the heart of London to the frozen solitudes of the Yukon, and when one saw the Bishop seated near the future Governor-General at a most sumptuous repast in Piccadilly, there came to mind the story of a moment when, lost in ice and snow on the prairies, he was glad to gnaw at his sealskin boots to save his life.

place their cavalry were routed by Freudi and 2,000 captured. German patriots were repelled near Longury and two German officers and 20 soldiers were killed. Germany has invaded French territory at Luxemburg and from Alence Lorraine.

FRANCE RETALIATES.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—France has invaded Germany with two army corps numbering 55,000 men, with heavy artillery. A despatch from Paris says that they crossed the frontier near Lasbeucht in the Vosges Mountains. The German army is advancing to meet them.

BELGIUM'S POSITION

AERIAL FIGHT.

A London report says that Garron, the French Aviator, rammed a German Military Dirigible in mid-air destroying the crew of 25 men and meeting death himself.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Germany has sent an ultimatum to Belgium offering an entente providing Belgium will facilitate the movements of German troops.

BELGIUM'S REFUSAL.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—A Brussels despatch to the Exchange Telegraph says that Belgium has refused Germany's proposal for an entente. The Kaiser's refusal to recognize Belgium's neutrality is reported to be the basis of action. Belgium will not allow the Kaiser's men to cross her territory en route for France.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 3.—According to a local newspaper the German troops have reached Vise on the River Meuz, only 12 miles from Liege, Belgium.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—A Paris despatch to the Telegraph says that the German troops have taken possession of the Belgium town of Arlon.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 3.—Belgium has cast in her lot with France against Germany.

COMMUNICATIONS CUT.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—A Paris despatch says all mail and telegraphic communications with Germany have ceased, as well as all railway communication with Belgium.

The Germans have blown up railway lines at all the frontier stations. No train is running in Belgium. Some 100,000 Germans in Paris are anxiously wondering how they are to return home.

ITALY'S NEUTRALITY.

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 3.—Italy continues her neutral stand but is mobilizing all her forces.

The Italian residents of Paris are forming a volunteer corps to help France. The French liners at sea are being ordered by wireless to return to the nearest French port.

JAPAN'S ATTITUDE.

TOKIO, Aug. 1.—Japan's attitude on the European crisis may be described as one of watchful waiting.

Should Great Britain become involved in the war and British rights and interests in eastern Asia or India be menaced or attacked, it is said that Japan, in fulfillment of the terms of her alliance with Great Britain, will assist that country. However, if the war is limited to Europe, Japan probably will remain neutral. Japan is preparing her army and navy forces.

FIGHTING ON FRENCH BORDER

LIEGE, BELGIUM, Aug. 3.—According to an evening newspaper published here 20,000 German troops crossed the French frontier this morning, near Nancy. They encountered the French forces and were repulsed with heavy losses. The news has not been confirmed.

PARIS, Aug. 3.—The invasion of French territory by German troops is regarded in official circles here as making war between the two countries start automatically without a formal declaration.

AUSTRIAN CLERGYMAN ASSURES AUTHORITIES OF PACIFIC INTENTIONS.

SYDNEY, Aug. 2.—Rev. Mr. Kin-sale, missionary to the foreigners at New Waterford, who is very much exercised over the report from Halifax stating that the authorities anticipated trouble from Austrians and Hungarians employed in Cape Breton industries, assures the authorities that in case of Great Britain being drawn into the conflict, these people will create no disturbance here, and trusts the authorities will see that they are not molested. While they naturally have their sympathies in the present struggle, they are far removed from the scene of warfare, and wish to carry on their peaceful occupation here without hindrance or annoyance to anyone. They have no intention of going to war, he says, on taking direct part in the struggle in which their country is engaged.

CALL TO 200,000 AUSTRIANS IN UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Commander Maximilian Hurstyn, Naval Attache of the Austrian Embassy, has sent out the "fiery cross," the call to arms to 200,000 Austrians in the United States subject to military duty.

ATTITUDE OF U. S. DEFINED.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Presid-

ent Wilson has stated that the United States would not issue a neutrality proclamation relating to the European war until it is more fully informed regarding the situation.

MAY CALL OFF THE YACHT RACE

LONDON, Aug. 3.—It is reported that Sir Thos. Lipton has decided to withdraw Shamrock IV. from the race.
