## Budget Passes In Federal House

### Conservatives Recorded Solid Vote For A Majority Of 36 Over All Other Groups Which Voted Against The Motion - One Exception.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 27—After a debate which has continued intermittently since April 11, the House of Commons today passed the budget by a majority of 36. Previously, the Liberal amendment which condemned the tariff policy of the Government, had been defeated by 46 votes.

In contrast to the crowded galleries and noisy House which last night defeated the U. F. A. sub-amendment, the Commons chamber presented a quiet and orderly scene as the votes were taken today. The crowds and color had shifted to the Senate Chamber where the Beauharnois report was under discussion. In the Commons galleries a few visitors watched the recording of the members names. On the floor

## MINE WORKERS WILL STAND BY POLICY

### U. M. W. Convention Adopts Policy Committee's Report Recommending Wage Increases Varying from 10 to 20 Per-cent.

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., April 27—(By The Canadian Press)—Climaxing nine days' deliberation, the special convention of United Mine Workers district 26 today adopted the policy committee's report which recommended the district executive stand by the policy laid down at the last district convention at Sydney in June, 1931, calling for wage increases varying from 10 to 20 percent, and which formed the basis of the initial negotiations entered into between the Union and the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation before the expiration of the last wage agreement. The policy adopted repudiates, in-

## ICE BREAKER STANDING BY THE SYDFOLD

### N. D. McLean Will Hardly Venture Into Shoal Water And Will Probably Make No Attempt To Refloat Collier.

HALIFAX, April 27. (By the Canadian Press)—The ice breaker N. D. McLean, it is understood, was standing by the collier Sydfold stranded at Wood Island, Prince Edward Island, today. It was not expected the McLean would attempt to refloat the Sydfold, however, as she is not equipped for the work and with her draft would hardly venture into the shoal water immediately surrounding the collier.

The steamer is in a dangerous position being on the shoals between Indian Rocks and the mainland, and the absence of deep water on any side will make it difficult for any boat to render assistance. It may be necessary to discharge part of the cargo to effect her release. However if the weather remains favorable the N. D. McLean may be able to get close enough to be of assistance.

## King And The Budget

OTTAWA, April 27—(C. P.)—"Don't place Empire relations on a dollar and cent basis," the Government was advised in the House of Commons today by Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Liberal leader. The Imperial Economic Conference would end in disruption and failure, he said, if a spirit of bargaining and national selfishness permeated the discussions.

## ANTIPODES OPEN MART TO CANADA

OTTAWA, April 27—Canada receives the full British preferential tariff on all exports to New Zealand with the exception of six items, under the Canada-New Zealand trade agreement made public here tonight by Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce. The pact is for one year—by reason of the coming Imperial Economic Conference—and will come into effect by proclamation following Parliamentary approval by the sister Dominions.

## Will Attend Many Social Functions This Summer

OTTAWA, April 27. (By the Canadian Press)—Future engagements of Their Excellencies the Governor General and Lady Bessborough are indicated in an announcement from Government House. The Governor General, who recently returned from a short holiday at St. Bruno, Que., has accepted an invitation to visit the Royal Military College at Kingston on May 9.

## Motion To Adopt Beauharnois Report Now Before Senate

OTTAWA, April 27—(By the Canadian Press)—Senator Charles E. Tanner moved the adoption of the Beauharnois report in the Upper House today. He was chairman of the special Senate committee investigating the conduct of three Liberal Senators, W. L. McDougald, Donald Raymond and Andrew Haydon in relation to the Beauharnois power and navigation project. The report condemned Senators McDougald and Haydon and in respect to Senator Raymond, passed a mild rebuke.

## HALIFAX NAMES NEW MAYOR

HALIFAX, N. S., April 27—(By the Canadian Press)—Albert Audley Thompson, druggist proprietor, today succeeded George E. Ritchie as Chief Magistrate of Halifax. The new Mayor polled majorities of 253 over Ritchie and 195 over J. W. McCarthy, his other opponent in a three cornered contest.

The returns are: Thompson, 1452; Ritchie, 1199; McCarthy, 1257. Montreal on May 27, they will go into residence at the Citadel, Quebec, and will be present at the Lieutenant Governor of Quebec's garden party at Spencerwood on the King's birthday, June 3. They hope to remain in residence at the Citadel until shortly before the opening of the Imperial Economic Conference, when they will return to Ottawa. Their Excellencies will leave Ottawa in the middle of August for a tour of Western Canada.
