MARKET REVIEW FOR JULY 29, 1931

CANADIAN NATIONAL

The Canadian National Railways have been able to effect a substantial offset against the decline in gross earnings during the first six months of this year as compared with the corresponding period of 1930. Gross showed a reduction of \$21,635,465, and the system was able to reduce its operating expenses \$11,570,600, or 53.5 per cent of the cut in gross receipts. In this respect the showing for June alone, when the saving in gross, was not as good as for the six-month period.

FROM FINANCIAL COUNSEL

At the regular meeting of the board of directors of Canadian Car and Foundry Company, the usual quarterly dividend on the 7 per cent preferred stock was declared, the 4th per share being payable October 10th to stockholders of record in September. This follows the declaration of the regular common dividend some time ago for payment of August 21st. In an interview with Financial Counsel W. W. Butler, president, stated that while the company's earnings building activities during the past few months its specialty with regard to dividend continuity the president reiterated statements he had previously made in effect that the company was abundantly supplied with cash and liquid resources and that insofar as he was able to see at this juncture both the preferred and common shareholders would continue to receive the regular dividends through the next fiscal year which opens on October 1st next.

MONTREAL, Que., July 29.—

There were 45 cattle, 82 calves, 550 hogs and 308 lambs for sale on the two Montreal Markets, today, including about 51 hogs and 240 lambs held over. Cattle were unchanged. Calves were steady at \$4.50 for common light veals to \$5.00 for fair to just medium kinds. Lambs were slow. A few small sales were made at \$7.00 for good lambs with fair to medium quality lambs from \$6.00 to \$6.50. Culls were from \$4.00 to \$5.00. Hogs were moving very slowly. An odd sale was made at \$8.00 with heavies around \$6.50.

NEW YORK, July 28.—(U.P.)—Over 150,000 men and women members of some 1,000 "nature culture" clubs have become devotees of the German nudist movement, according to a survey published here recently by a Physical Culture.

COFFEE FLUFF

Left Over Coffee

(Special to Johnston & Ward)

Do not throw away left-over coffee. Many delicious desserts, puddings, cakes and jellies can be made with coffee flavoring. Or it may be strained, heated and added to fresh coffee. There is:

MOCHA FROSTING

One-third cup of butter, 1/4 cups of confectioner's sugar, 1 table-spoon cocoa, coffee infusion. Cream butter and add sugar gradually, continuing the beating, then add cocoa and coffee, drop by drop, until of right consistency to spread.

COFFEE CREAM CAKE

Quarter cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup very strong coffee (cold), 6 eggs (whites and yolks beaten separately), 2 cups flour, 2 tea-spoons baking powder; cream butter and sugar, add beaten yolks and baking powder sifted with flour. Add alternately with coffee and beaten whites last. Bake in moderate oven in 2-layer cake pans.

COFFEE AND MOCHA ICING

Three table-spoons strong hot coffee, 3 table-spoons dry cocoa, 1 cup confectioner's sugar, 1/2 tea-spoon vanilla. Add coffee to cocoa, stir until smooth, add vanilla and enough sugar to spread.

COFFEE TAPACA

Four cups hot strong coffee, 1/2 cup tapaca, 1/2 cup sugar. Place all in sauce pan, let cook 15 minutes or until soft and clear. Pour into custard cup. Serve cold with sweetened and flavored whipped cream.
