Mr. Morson gave notice in the Legislature yesterday that he will today ask the Honorable the Leader of the Government what action was taken by the Government of this Province to carry into effect the Resolution of this House passed at the last Session thereof, whereby the Government was ordered to draw the attention of the Governor General in Council to the Resolution of this House passed in the Session of 1905 respecting winter communication and to take such measures as would be necessary to impress upon the Governor General in Council the necessity for immediate action especially as regards the construction of a tunnel.

Mr. Mathieson gave notice in the Legislature yesterday that he will today ask the Honorable the Leader of the Government: (1) What action, if any, has been taken by the Government since the 30th day of September, A.D. 1906 to provide for the Consolidation of the debt of this Province. (2) That all correspondence relating to this matter be laid on the table of the House. He has also given notice that he will ask the Honorable the Leader of the Government to lay on the table of the House a statement showing: (1) the name or names of the bank or banks from which the Government of this Province has borrowed money since the 30th day of September, 1906. (2) The amount or respective amounts due or owing or becoming due to such bank or banks by the said Government (a) on the 30th day of September, A. D., 1907 (b) on the 31st day of December, A. D., 1907. (3) The amount of interest paid on such loans for the year ending 30th September, 1907 and the rate or several rates of interest paid. (4) Has the rate of interest paid by the Government to the banks been increased since the 30th September, 1906? If so, what was the rate of increase? (5) What is the present rate of interest paid and upon what sum or sums?

The fiftieth annual report of the Nova Scotia Hospital just presented to the House of Assembly, Halifax, contains besides the usual financial and statistical information regarding the institution a very interesting historical sketch of the institution by Dr. Hattie, the Medical Superintendent who visited this city in January last. In his sketch Dr. Hattie says Nova Scot' a was the last of the old B. N. A. provinces to make appropriate provision for its insane. It is from the Journal of the House of Assembly for 1845 that we learn that the 22nd of February of that year "a petition of the Mayor, Aldermen and Common Council of Halifax was presented by A. M. Uniacke and read praying for aid towards a lunatic asylum or general hospital in said City, for which large subscriptions have been made." It was referred to a Select Committee and on March 14th of that year a despatch from the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick to Lord Falkland relative to the establishment of a lunatic asylum jointly for Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island was referred to the same committee. The report of the latter on March 25th stated, among other things, that the Mayor of Halifax (Hon. Hugh Bell) had contributed £300 and others had contributed £540 towards the establishment of an asylum. They had found that in the Poor Asylum were 42 insane persons and estimated that at least 200 other insane people were to be found in the Province. In accordance with a recommendation of the Committee Lord Falkland despatches a Commission consisting of Hon. Hugh Bell, S. P. Fairbank and Dr. A. F. Sawers to visit New Brunswick, enquire into the feasibility of a joint institution for the three Provinces and then pass on to several of the American States to gain information about the construction, equipment, organization and management of such institutions.
