Bracelets are worn in rows of six and seven—they can't be too many. Twin bracelets are a matter of choice, but half a dozen are not too many.

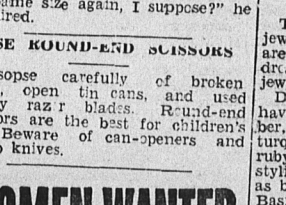
Rings are worn outside gloves, and even gloves are jeweled.

**Needlecraft—  
—For The Home**

With busy days ahead you'll want to be prepared. Make this neat looking house frock to wear while you are preparing for festivities, and you're bound to feel right in the spirit of the occasion. Tiny checked gingham or a gay print is just right for this pattern frock. Buttons down the front make it easy to slip into or take off without mussing your hair. With long sleeves and no pockets it also makes a nice street dress in sheer wool or crepe. Your family will be proud of you and your budget will be pleased if you stitch this smart frock up for yourself.

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**Washing Day**  
Add a tablespoon methylated spirits to the last rinsing water of table and tray clothes. It gives them a glossy crispness when ironed, that can't be beaten. Loose covers lengthen the life of mattresses and keep them cleaner. The covers can be washed easily in soap flakes; shake enough into hot water to make a good lather, soak the cover for a couple of minutes and then squeeze through the lather and rub the extra dirty parts; rinse in three waters and iron when almost dry.

**CARE FOR WEAK POINTS**  
The housewife who is stronger in some ways than others will be wise to study these points and arrange to work a way to help her through the day without getting so tired. If her feet are her weak point, she will stop for a while during each hour and do some darning or sewing. If her eyes are poor she will sandwich in some cleaning between her sewing and reading. 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### THE COOK'S CORNER

**EGGLESS SUET PUDDING**  
1 cup flour  
1-8 teaspoon salt  
1-8 teaspoon cinnamon  
1-2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1-2 cups bread crumbs  
1 cup finely chopped suet  
2 tablespoons brown sugar  
1 cup raisins  
1-2 cup currants  
1 cup sour milk  
1 cup corn syrup  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 tablespoon boiling water

**METHOD:** Mix and sift the flour, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Add the crumbs, the suet, sugar, and the fruit. Mix these together thoroughly.

Mix the milk and the syrup and heat slightly. Mix well and add to the dry ingredients, then add the soda, dissolved in the boiling water. Mix until the dry ingredients are moistened.

Fill buttered mould or bowl 2-3 full. Cover and steam for 2 hours.

**FRUIT PUDDING**  
1-2 cup butter  
1-2 cups brown sugar  
6 eggs  
1-2 teaspoons salt  
3 teaspoons baking p-wder  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1-3 cup flour  
1-2 pound raisins  
1-4 pound citron  
1-2 pound currants  
1 teaspoon grated orange rind

**METHOD:** Cream the butter and gradually cream in the brown sugar. Add the eggs, one at a time and beat thoroughly after each addition. Sift the salt, baking powder, cinnamon and the flour and add these to the chopped raisins, citron, the washed and dried currants, the grated orange rind and the crumbs. Add the fruit and stir until creamed mixture and stir until well-blended. Pour into pudding moulds, filling them 2-3 full and steam for 3 hours.

**GINGERBREAD**  
One-half cup shortening, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1 cup each of milk and molasses, 2 1/2 cups flour, 1-2 teaspoon each of baking soda and salt, 2 tablespoons ginger, 1/2 cup for a cake, sifting together the flour, baking soda and salt. Pour into a shallow greased cake pan, and bake at 350 degrees for about forty-five minutes. Serve hot, with whipped cream, or cream cheese.
